Italy contains 545 registered indigenous grape varietals, though it is estimated that there over 2,000 throughout the country. There are so many, in fact, that we don't know the exact number, but there are more wine-making grapes native to the land we call Italy than any other country in the world. It is an absolute treasure trove of wine, and we will never cease to uncover its many vinous gems.

Of Italy's 20 distinct regions, every single one contains significant wine-growing areas (an aspect also unique to the country), spanning the length of this 1,200-kilometre peninsula that covers the mountainous regions of the north to the salt-blown coastal regions of the south, and every lush green foothill in between. An astonishing array of styles and colours and flavours are produced from these native grapes, most of which are not found anywhere else in the world.

At Divino, one of our highest goals – and one of my great responsibilities as Sommelier – is to bring these one-of-a-kind, rare, and distinctly Italian wines to your table, to provide as much access as possible to this panoply of wine variety and beauty. This is no easy feat, and not one that we take lightly. But boy, is it fun: every year, we taste hundreds of wines, bringing in only those we think are best, traveling to wineries to learn more about the source behind these gems, and bring it all back to you here, on this wine list, as well as the many events we host every year here at Divino including our tasting menus, bi-monthly wine tastings, Enomatic machine, wine flights, and the many other efforts we take to give you the chance to experience these wines of passion, history, geography, heart.

I hope, wherever you're at on your wine journey or whatever the nature of your visit to Divino today, that in the following pages you will find just the wine for whatever purpose you are looking for or, perhaps, that might just surprise you too. Wine is amazing by itself, better with food, and best with people, and our goal is to combine these elements in such a way as to provide you with the best possible experience, so if there's anything that I or a member of my amazing team can do to enhance your wine or your experience, please let us know.

### A couple of points to keep in mind as you peruse this list:

- The wine world is replete with terminology requiring definition too many to list here so if you have a question or are unsure what a word or term means, just ask me or one of my colleagues.
- Wine labels (especially Italian ones) are notoriously difficult to understand, so each entry has a basic format: The Wine/Name of the Wine, Producer, Vintage.
- Italian wine is categorized into three tiers of Italian wine law that regulate how it's made (there is a fourth, Vino da Tavola, that does not appear on this list) and are indicated throughout this list by their acronym: the second-lowest tier, IGT (Indicazione Geografica Indica), then DOC (Denominazione d'Origine Controllata), and the highest tier, DOCG (Denominazione d'Origine Controllata e Garantita).

So, please, read through this list, be curious and adventurous and open, ask any question you want, read my descriptors and point out my spelling errors, have fun with it and with the extraordinary range of flavours and emotions that Italian wine evokes. Italian wine is a world all to its own, and it is our great privilege to bring you just this small slice of it.

Cheers to you, your loved ones, your meal, and may whatever you drink today bring all of that together even more than it already was.

CHAMPAGNE	PRICE
Cristal Prestige Cuvée, Louis Roederer, 2013* The 'Prestige Cuvée' (or 'Tête de Cuvée) is the top bottling of a Champagne house and is usually given its own name, in this case 'Cristal' by the legendary house, Louis Roederer. A blend a Grand Crus from old vines in Roederer's best vineyards and only made in the best vintages. 60% Pinot Noir, 40% Chardonnay.	370
Dom Pérignon, Moët & Chandon, 2013*  The story goes that a monk named Dom Pérignon fermented his bottle of wine a second time and got so excited that he called to his friends, 'Come quickly, I'm tasting the stars!' This story almost certainly isn't true, but, the legendary status of this Prestige Cuvée is no myth and has been so for decades.  Textural, creamy, complex, layered sparkling. 60% Chardonnay, 40% Pinot Noir.	330
Brut Réserve, Taittinger, NV A blend of 35 Grand Cru and Premier Cru parcels, aged 4 years on its lees. 40% Chardonnay, 35% Pinot Noir, 25% Pinot Meunier.	120
Special Cuvée, Bollinger, NV A vivacious blend combining harvest grapes (85% of which are from Grand Cru and Premier Cru vineyards) with Reserve wines in Magnums, some of which are up to 15 years old. 60% Pinot Noir, 25% Chardonnay, 15% Pinot Meunie	110 r.
ITALIAN SPARKLING	
Italian sparkling wine is undergoing a silent, delicious revolution. The entries here cover three styles of Italian sparkling (Franciacorta DOCG in Lombardia, Trentodoc DOC in Trentino-Alto Adige, and Alta Langa DOCG in Piemonte) that utilise the Champagne or 'traditional' method of production, where the secondary fermentation occurs in individual bottles, rather than in tanks. Such wines are known for having a crisper structure and mouthfeel, more concentrated flavour, and finer, more lively bubbles, as though they're happy to be there.	
TRADITIONAL METHOD	
Franciacorta Cuvée Prestige 45a Edizione, Ca' del Bosco, NV One of the most famous sparklers to ever come out of Italy; a blend of 197 different vineyards, 162 of which are Chardonnay alone, and made in the rare Extra Brut style, so less sugar than the typical 'Brut' style of sparkler; 25 months aging on its lees. 75% Chardonnay, 15% Pinot Noir, 10% Pinot Blanc.	130
Franciacorta, Ferghettina, NV Ferghettina's core sparkler, quintessential Franciacorta, aged 30 months on the lees. 85% Chardonnay, 15% Pinot Noir.	74
Franciacorta Rosé, Ferghettina, NV Two days on the skins to extract colour, 36 months on the lees to extract flavour and texture. 80% Pinot Noir, 20% Chardonnay.	98
Trentodoc Brut Cuvée, Ferrari, NV From the very first winery to produce Champagne-method sparklers in the now famous Trentodoc DOC, and with no relation to the car, though it just might get your heart racing: 20 months' aging on the lees and made entirely from Chardonnay grapes.	70
Trentodoc Rosé Maximum, Ferrari, NV Thirty-six months' lees aging on this rare, exceptional sparkling rosé. 70% Pinot Noir, 30% Chardonnay.	80
Alta Langa Millesimato Brut, Scrimaglio, 2021 The newest DOCG to hit the Italian sparkling scene, and one of the most exciting, is Alta Langa. All sparklers here are required to be Vintage wines by law, and this one by Scrimaglio is aged for	69

PROSECCO	PRICE
Prosecco Millesimato, Biscardo, 2023 What makes Prosecco DOC unique, apart from its use of the Glera grape (which is rarely seen anywhere else), is its method of production, the Charmat Method, where secondary fermentation occurs in a large tank. The wine has less contact with the lees and less pressure inside the bottle as a result, producing a fruitier, more forward, elegant style. Lovely as a pairing wine or as an aperitivo.	42
Prosecco Rosé Millesimato, Biscardo, 2023  Prosecco DOC has no minimum aging time, so, with less time on the lees, this is a more fruit-forward style of sparkling Rosé, whose colour comes from 15% Pinot Noir to round out the Glera grapes used in the blend.	40
ROSÉ AND ORANGE	
Ribolla Gialla Amfora, Gravner, 2014 What Andrea Pirlo was to the midfield, Josko Gravner is to orange style wine: often copied and what everyone aspires to be, but never quite like the maestro himself. Ribolla Gialla grapes are left in contact with their skins in clay amphora jars for six months (six months!) in underground cellars and then aged in botti, above ground, for six years (six years!). A wine in a category all its own.	168
Veneto Bianco Amphora, Lorenzo Fidora, 2021 Wild-fermented, single-vineyard Pinot Grigio spends four months in terracotta amphora jars, brilliantly-coloured and complex.	55
Cerasuolo d'Abruzzo, Cingilia, 2022 A DOC devoted strictly to rosé wines, this Cerasuolo d'Abruzzo spends a tantalizing 36 hours on Montepulciano skins (most rosé's spend less than half that time macerating), resulting in a brilliantly-hued rosé packed with red fruit flavours, minerality, and the scent of flowers as though you were sitting in the Peligna Valley itself. 13.5% ABV, 0% residual sugar.	48
Le Rosé, Regaleali, 2023 A deeply-hued rosé aged for three months in stainless steel, emphasising freshness and fruit. 100% Nerello Mascalese from Sicilia IGT.	43
Lagrein Rosato, Mezzacorona, 2023 Lagrein is a little-heralded red grape from Trentino-Alto Adige DOC that here produces a crisp, red-fruited rosé.	38
Bardolino Chiaretto, Bolla, 2023  A DOC given specifically for rosé's in 2018; our palest rosé and a classic  Veneta bland of 55% Conving 35% Pendinalla, 10% Malinara	36

Chassagne-Montrachet 1er Cru Morgeot, Domaine du Duc de Magenta, 2002 Chassagne-Montrachet is the second most famous commune in the world for Chardonnay (behind only Puligny-Montrachet), is one of the very few white wines in the world known for its aging capabilities, and here comes from the renowned Morgeot Premier Cru, from the Monopole Clos de la Chapelle owned by Louis Jadot. This is full-bodied yet elegant, extravagant yet subtle, aged yet full of life.	158
Chablis, Domaine Chaude Ecuelle, 2020 Chablis is the northernmost region of Burgundy and it shows in this cool-climate bottling: zest, freshness, steel, and minerality combine with Chardonnay's trademark body and elegance. All stainless steel.	64
LOIRE VALLEY	
Amboise Sec Le Clocher, Bonnigal-Bodet, 2023  A dry, single-vineyard, extraordinarily aromatic and complete expression of Chenin Blanc from the Amboise region of the Loire Valley.	76
Pouilly-Fumé, Domaine Favray, 2023 The soil around the town of Pouilly-Fumé is high in flint and limestone, producing this smoky, flinty, concentrated style of Sauvignon.	60
NORTHERN RHÔNE	
Condrieu, StCosme, 2022 Viognier at its apex: Condrieu is a Cru within the Northern Rhone known exclusively for its Viognier: floral, exotic, rich, full-bodied.	108
GERMANY	
Riesling Dry Schieferkristall, Weingut Karthäuserhof, 2021 Karthäuserhof is the 8th-oldest winery in the world and has made a name for itself along the Mosel River and its tributaries for its piercing, fresh, minerally style of dry Riesling, this one from the Schieferkristall vineyard.	69
Riesling Kabinett Binger Scharlachberg, Weingut Riffel, 2021  Most German Riesling is produced with some residual sugar to buffer the searing acidity natural to the grape;  this is a balanced fruity floral expression of that style so unique to German winemaking.	5

Godello 'Louro do Bolo' Valdeorras, Rafael Palacios, 2023 Godello from northwest Spain is shocking for its elegance, purity, and complexity, as well as for how little it is known or appreciated. Rafael Palacios is one of the top producers of the Valdeorras and I was thrilled when I discovered this evocative expression of Godello.	64
Albariño Family Estate Selection, Bodegas Castro Martin, 2022  The Atlantic Ocean batters the coast of northwest Spain and, in doing, releases fog banks that deposit salt water onto Albariño grapes hanging on the vine that will soon express that fog in its salty, fresh, minerally style of white wine so beloved worldwide.	42
AUSTRIA	
Grüner Veltliner Ried Sandgrube, Rainer Wess, 2022 A peppery, spicy, fresh, concentrated single-vineyard expression from Kremstal, a top appellation in Austria for its main white grape.	59
SLOVENIA	
Ribolla, Marjan Simčič, 2023 This wine comes from the Brda region, the primary appellation for Ribolla in Slovenia, and is just the other side of the border from Friuli in Italy, where it is known as Ribolla Gialla. Fourty-eight hours skin contact lend depth and expressiveness to this elegant style.	55
GREECE	
Santorini Assyrtiko, Artemis Karamolegos, 2022 Wine from a volcano! This is a precise, fabulous, and quite powerful expression of Assyrtiko, the most important grape in Greece, with 5% each contributed from two other indigenous varietals, Athiri and Aidani, the latter of which originates on Santorini.	79
NEW ZEALAND	
Sauvignon Blanc, Frost Pocket, 2022 The term 'frost pocket' refers to the conjunction where cooler temperatures meet ocean fog, producing this crisp, refreshing, and quite quintessential expression of Kiwi Sauvignon Blanc.	46



TRENTINO-ALTO ADIGE	PRICE
Sauvignon 'Lafóa', Colterenzio, 2017 Sauvignon Blanc like you've never tasted before: a brief cold soak on the skins, 8 months aging on the lees, and half of the wine fermented in oak barrels, impeccably integrated, producing power, freshness, zest, complexity.	90
Chardonnay 'Lafóa', Colterenzio, 2022 Aging takes place in a combination of new and used oak but the style is a more lean, mineral, medium-bodied, style. Ten months aging on the lees, a further 6 months in bottle prior to release. Like drinking wine etched from stone; Chablis on steroids.	98
Gewürztraminer, Colterenzio, 2023 Dry Gewürztraminer, so that full-bodied unctuousness is pure fruit and winemaking, not sugar. Aromatic, exotic, yet fresh.	5
Müller Thurgau, Tiefenbrunner, 2022 A cross between Riesling and Madeleine Royale, Müller Thurgau was designed to thrive in cooler, northern regions, and that it does in Alto Adige: fragrant, medium-bodied, and fresh, so basically a cross between German and Italian winemaking as well.	46
VALLE D'AOSTA	
Petite Arvine, La Source, 2021 The Valle d'Aosta is its own DOC, the smallest region in Italy, and extremely mountainous, so a very cool-climate and a perfect cradle for white wine production; Petite Arvine is native to Valais Valley of Switzerland and has finesse, minerality, balance, and fruit to spare.	53
FRIULI-VENEZIA GIULIA	
Friulano, Livio Felluga, 2023 One of the top expressions of Friulano you are likely to come across by a patriarch of Friuli winemaking. A short maceration period followed by 6 months of aging on the lees. Medium-bodied but with that freshness and minerality of Friuli Colli Orientali DOC soils.	68
Ciallabianco, Ronchi di Cialla, 2014 One of those rare finds that I get giddy to come across. Exotic blend of 60% Ribolla Gialla, 30% Verduzzo, 10% Picolit, all native to the Cialla Valley and entirely from the Cialla subzone of the Colli Orientali DOC. With its 10+ years of age, this is a wine of dazzling depth and complexity and with that lovely dance between richness and acidity.	89
Chardonnay, Vie di Romans, 2023 From the renowned Isonzo DOC, known for its famous ponca soil, a mix of marl and sandstone that yields a more powerful, yet restrained, version of the amazing and shadow-shifting Chardonnay grape. This extraordinary effort sees 9 months aging in barrel and on the lees, but they are just part of the ensemble of exotic fruit, minerality, toast, nuttiness.	94
Collio Riserva, Zuani, 2020  A radiant, full-flavoured blend of Friulano, Pinot Grigio, Sauvignon Blanc, and Chardonnay, all left to ripen a little later than the single-varietal bottlings, which, along with Collio DOC's cherished ponca soil, contributes that little extra punch of texture, aroma, and personality, yet still bristling with acidity. Fermented in steel and then aged in French barrique for 10 months.	78
Carso Malvasia, Castelvecchio, 2023 Carso is a little-known DOC and means 'rocky land' in Latin, a reference to the panoply of white limestone soil that grape-growers can only dream of. White wines do just fine in this chalky soil, including this medium-bodied, layered, balanced, and fruity Malvasia.	49
Carso Vitovska, Castelvecchio, 2023 Vitovska is indigenous to Slovenia, where the Carso region (see above entry) is known as Kras. Such a unique and rich grape and drinking experience, it is naturally high in acidity and citrus compounds and expresses the minerality of Carso beautifully.	56

Soave Classico La Rocca, Pieropan, 2022  La Rocca is a single vineyard located on one of the few limestone outcroppings in the Soave Classico DOC and helps to produce this layered, rich, concentrated, stunning example of Garganega.	74
Vespaiolo, Maculan, 2022 Only about 100 HA worldwide are devoted to this ancient varietal, most of which are found in Breganze, its homeland and the name of this DOC. It is naturally high in both sugar and acidity, producing a combination of full-bodied fruitiness with a lively beam of acidity.	58
Gambellara Classico 'Sarò', Cristiana Meggiolaro, 2012 'Sarò' means 'I will be' in Italian and refers to the potential of what these Garganega grapes – from low-yield vines planted on volcanic soils rich in basaltic lava, schist, and tufa, in the underrated Gambellara Classico DOC – can become with time.	52
Pinot Grigio 'Monopolio', Cantina di Gambellara, 2024 Classic, fresh, hot-summer-day expression of Pinot Grigio from a cooperative of about 200 family-growers.	38
Soave Classico 'Sereole', Bertani, 2023 From the Sereole vineyard, so you get a touch of its marl-limestone soils, a touch of oak (5 months, large barrel), and a touch of skin contact, all adding nuance and layers to this crisp, light-bodied Garganega, the darling white grape of Soave Classico DOC.	39
LOMBARDIA	
Lugana 'Cromalgo', Corte Sermana, 2019 Some people go to Lake Garda for the villas; we go there for the wine. Lugana is a DOC for the white Turbiana grape (or Trebbiano di Lugana), a local and late-ripening varietal, located right off the lake's shores, which supplies climate-moderating winds and minerality.	58
EMILIA-ROMAGNA	
Chardonnay 'Austo', Terre Cevico, 2024 Charming Chardonnay with plenty of oak spice, full flavour, and holding its own in the land of balsamic vinegar and prosciutto.	46
TOSCANA	
Bolgheri Vermentino, Antinori Guado al Tasso, 2023 This complex yet fresh white benefits from Bolgheri DOC's adjacency to the sea, which mitigates the Tuscan summer sun with its cooling breezes, and from being in the hands of one of the great wineries Italy has ever seen in Antinori.	69
Vernaccia di San Gimignano, Castellani, 2022 In the shadows of San Gimignano's famous medieval towers are some of the most important vines in Italy: Vernaccia di San Gimignano was the very first DOC in the country in 1966 (it is now DOCG); documentation of its value as a wine grape go back to the 13th century.	35
Vernaccia di San Gimignano Riserva Vigna a Solatio, Falchini, 2012  An extraordinary single-vineyard expression given another layer of nuance by the extra year in barrel; the grapes for this came from the very top of the hill, where the one-two punch of optimal sun exposure with cooling breezes is maximised; balanced, rich, exquisite.	68
BASILICATA	
Il Preliminare, Cantine del Notaio, 2021 A fascinating white blend from a region and IGT, Basilicata, more known for its reds, and this wine plays its part: 30% Aglianico grapes (a red) are pressed off the skins (like a white) and accompanied by 30% Chardonnay, 20% Malvasia Bianca, 20% Moscato. Brilliant.	50



PIEMONTE	RICE
Roero Arneis 'Pradalupo', Fontanafredda, 2023 Only half of the Arneis grapes are de-stemmed, resulting in a lovely herbal touch to this fresh, fruity white from the Roero DOCG.	51
Timorasso 'Il Montino', La Colombera, 2014 Timorasso knows exactly how Taylor felt in 'You Belong with Me': underappreciated, in the background, not noticed for what it offers, but when given the chance, is elegant, dazzling in its complexity, and is actually what you've been looking for the whole time. From the Colli Tortonesi DOC, this is cryomacerated for 4 days and then fermented in stainless steel, begging for your attention.	74
GAVI DOCG	
Perhaps Piemonte's most famous white wine, based entirely on the Cortese grape, and covering an area so diverse in soils and microclimates that the expressions of Cortese are similarly as diverse, fascinating, and exciting. Limestone clays, ancient seabed, and volcanic soils all leave their mark on Cortese grapes that, when grown inside the commune of Gavi, will be labelled 'Gavi di Gavi', as opposed to just 'Gavi', which is when the grapes were not sourced within the town of Gavi but from other towns still within the official DOCG zone. Because of the diversity of soils, winemaking, and weather, they will all have their own refreshing, balanced, minerally things to say.	,
Gavi di Gavi 'La Minaia', Bergaglio, 2024 100% Cortese, 100% stainless steel, 100% from the commune of Gavi, 100% delicious.	49
Gavi Vigneto Ciapon, Bergaglio, 2021  An exhilarating, complex single-vineyard expression of Cortese that captivates with its marriage of sweet, dried fruit flavours with earthy, smoky nuances. Surely unlike any Gavi you've ever had but expresses the range and potential of this grape beautifully.	55
Gavi Riserva Vigna della Rovere Verde, La Mesma, 2020 A stunning example of what Gavi and a bit of extended aging can produce. A single-vineyard based entirely on Old Vines from a small estate in Gavi; 18 months in concrete, then 18 months in bottle.  Deeply hued and flavoured, with all that Gavi touch and freshness.	74
UMBRIA	
Surely one of the most underrated of all the white wine regions of Italy, Umbria has this unfair advantage of combining top-notch producers (like Tabarrini and this other guy named Antinori), with sensational indigenous varietals like Trebbiano Spoletino, with perfect, hilly growing conditions. Everything here, from the full-bodied Chardonnays to the crisp blends of Montefalco, brims with life and complexity.	
'Adarmando' Umbria Bianco, Tabarrini, 2016 A jaw-dropping drinking experience whether or not full-bodied, exotic, aromatic whites are your thing: 100% Trebbiano Spoletino (which breaks Montefalco DOC blending regulations, so is IGT) grapes are cryomacerated for 2 days then aged on the lees, in steel, for a full year. No Malolactic, no oak, no chaptalization, nothing like it.	69
Orvieto Classico Superiore, Antinori San Giovanni della Sala, 2023  A complex, precise wine based on Grechetto, the main grape of Orvieto DOC:  50% Grechetto, 25% Procanico, 13% Viognier, 12% Pinot Bianco. Minimal intervention as everything is finished in steel with a few months of lees aging; all that flavour is grapes and provenance.	71
Cervaro della Sala, Antinori Castello della Sala, 2022 Iconic Chardonnay and possibly the most famous to ever come out of Italy. Chardonnay grapes are harvested in the very early morning to preserve purity and acidity and then fermented (but not aged) in barrel for a few months when the remaining 15% of the wine is blended with the indigenous Grechetto, which saw only stainless steel, for further freshness and aromatics. A special wine.	150
Montefalco Bianco, Arnaldo Caprai, 2023 A lovely floral, peppery, salty expression of a classic white blend of the Montefalco DOC: 60% Trebbiano Spoletino, 40% Chardonnay.	46



Verdicachio dei Castelli di Jesi Classico Riserva 'Passolento', La Marca di San Michele, 2016 Passolento is the top bottling of this estate, from a parcel located on an ancient seabed of this DOCG, and the grapes are aged in 10 habrate [bottl] to give jut a kas of odis without overwhelming the purity of the fruit and to allow its enormous complexity to develop.  Verdicachio dei Castelli di Jesi Classico, Fazi Battaglia, 2023 The bottle shape fannously mimics the Roman amphara jurs discovered near the winery, and the wine has equalled it in reputation, one of the first Verdicchio wines to ever be exported and exhibiting that fresh, seaside zing that we all look for in the Castelli di Jesi DOC. ### **BURGUNDY**

You will see the influence of Burgundy throughout this wine list: it was Cistercian monks in Burgundy in the 1300s that first discovered that wine made in the same way with the same grapes tasted different if they came from a different vineyard. Those monks measured out some of the most reliable vineyards in the world, and to this day, Burgundians rank the quality of their vineyards based in large part on what these dedicated monks measured out centuries ago. And their influence has crossed borders: Barolo and Barbaresco have essentially adopted their 'cru' system (the Burgundian term for a single site) and will always list the vineyard name if it's not a blend. Throughout the Italian section of this list, where you see the words 'Vigna' or 'Vigneto', you can know that this is a single-vineyard wine. Monks really know their booze.

# Gevrey-Chambertin Premier Cru Fonteny, Domaine Henri Rebourseau, 1995 From one of the great communes for Pinot Noir the world over, Gevrey-Chambertin, known for producing the most powerful versions of the grape in all of the Cote d'Or, but with time, they unfold into wines of great complexity and nuance. Fonteny is a plot of very rocky soil, producing smaller berries, enhancing that power and concentration even further.

This elegant version from Javernand is precise, fruity, and light on its feet while also having depth.

# Saint-Estèphe, Château Lilian Ladouys, 2016 Saint-Èstephe is technically a Left Bank commune (where blends are Cab-dominated), but this wine is led by Merlot: 62%, then 33% Cabernet Sauvignon, 3% Petit Verdot, 2% Cabernet Franc. Rich and complex, well-aged Bordeaux. Margaux Deuxième Cru, Château Lascombes, 1990

### **BAROLO**

A mountaintop wine, one capable of stealing the show all on its own: Barolo. Made from the indomitable Nebbiolo grape, and traditionally aged in ultra-large barrels known as botti (many of which are taller than the room you sit in), Barolo DOCG has two main things going for it: a spellbinding complexity of flavour that covers everything from flowers to smoke to red fruits to spice to minerals, and the magic trick of having a light-to-medium-bodied frame buttressed by hefty tannins and acidity, like a croissant stuffed with filet mignon. The soils here have two main divisions: La Morra and Barolo soils have higher concentrations of calcareous marl, which produces lower tannins and a more elegant style of wine; the other three major communes (Serralunga d'Alba, Castiglione Falletto, Monforte d'Alba) have more sandstone, which produces wines of elevated tannin, structure, and power. Both styles are quintessential Nebbiolo, glorious with food, and an experience all to themselves.

#### Barolo Cascina Francia, Giacomo Conterno, 2018

Conterno is a wizard with Nebbiolo and his Monfortino is one of the most famous Barolos ever produced, but in 2018 he decided to forego the Monfortino and instead blended those barrels in with his Cascina Francia. The hype around this wine, therefore, has exploded; strike while you can.

### Barolo Cannubi, Giacomo Brezza, 2020

If ever there was a 'Grand Cru' of Barolo, it would be Cannubi, Piemonte's most famous vineyard that sits almost smack in the heart of the Barolo MGA zone, the surrounding hills and hamlets shielding it from extreme weather and allowing the grapes to reach optimal ripeness and complexity with a long, peaceful growing season. #### **MONTEPULCIANO**

Renaissance-era nobility adored the wines of Montepulciano so much that they requested that plantings of the grape – a biotype of Sangiovese known as Prugnolo Gentile – be increased, so the grape was planted in the Peligna Valley in Abruzzo, where local farmers referred to it as "that Montepulciano grape" and the moniker stuck, resulting in the mass confusion, to this day, between the wines of the Montepulciano grape in Abruzzo and the wines of the Montepulciano town in Tuscany, one of the great DOCGs for Sangiovese in Italy.

Vino Nobile di Montepulciano Riserva, Il Macchione, 2016 Pure Sangiovese glory here, 100% Prugnolo Gentile aged for 36 months in large barrels that seemed to only help the Sangiovese along towards what it does best: savoury, complex, meaty power reined in by Tuscan rusticity and finesse.

### **MONTALCINO**

Montalcino is a walled town sitting on the precipice of a hill, which is no small metaphor. The wines here have garnered international fame and are considered some of the best Italy has to offer, based entirely on a clone of Sangiovese called Brunello, a thicker-skinned version of Italy's most-planted grape, which means its wines are a bit more robust, full, and structured than Chianti's or Vino Nobile's. There is more limestone around Montalcino as well, and the Monte Amiata range to the southeast protects the region from sudden rain or hail. At its best, Brunello di Montalcino DOCG is a full-bodied, richly flavoured tour de force that beckons us to slow down and notice the many things it can do to our palates, capable of aging as well as wowing us right now.

### Brunello do Montalcino, Canalicchio di Sopra, 2016

160

Brunello, more than many other varietals, wears the vintage on its sleeve, and this is nowhere more apparent than the now legendary 2016, a growing season so precise and balanced that the wines display the same characteristics: harmony, elegance, this wonderful tug-of-war between ripeness and freshness. Red fruit flavours meet meatiness, savoury nuance, and attitude in this bottling.

### Brunello di Montalcino, Conti Costanti, 2015\*

174

Andrea Costanti has firmly established himself as one of the top winemakers in the region; such is his pursuit of quality that he intentionally sat out the sub-par 2014 vintage because he didn't believe in its quality. That changed (and then some) with 2015, a widely acclaimed vintage whose big, powerful wines are in a lovely place right now. Muscular, energetic, serious wine.

#### Brunello di Montalcino, Biondi-Santi, 2017\*

420

In 1842, Feruccio Biondi Santi isolated a clone of the Sangiovese grape that became known as Sangiovese Grosso, or 'Brunello' due to the brownish-orange colour it adopted in the glass. The Biondi-Santi family continues to craft one of the best expressions of this famous grape: fiercely flavoured with elegance, structure, purity of fruit, and a mouthfeel almost as legendary as the family name.

### Brunello do Montalcino Riserva 'Pian di Conte', Talenti, 2016\*

190

Riccardo Talenti's top bottling, made only in exceptional vintages, and using grapes from the estate's oldest vines on sandy soils with lots of stones, which radiate sunlight to enhance ripening, meaning the balance with the high elevation here is extraordinary. Six years' aging includes 2 years in large barrel, combining French tonneaux with 15-25 hl Slavonian botti.

### Brunello di Montalcino, Fuligni, 1999

145

From the 5-star 1999 vintage and in one of Brunello's sweet spots: earthy funk combines with red fruits, florals, tobacco spice, leather, an amazingly alive mouthfeel, deeply complex, with a zest for life that keeps you wanting more of it, and vice versa.

### Brunello di Montalcino Riserva, Gianfranco Soldera, 2005

1,349

Soldera's wines have developed an impassioned cult following among Montalcino enthusiasts, producing some of the most sought-after Brunello's since they started fermenting grapes in 1970. His wines are rare and hard to find, especially the Riservas, especially at this age, especially since his passing in 2019...this is truly rare, cherished juice here.

### Brunello di Montalcino Columbaio di Montosoli, Baricci, 2017

135

This was a warm year so you feel the heat and the body from such a vintage but this wine matches it with lift and complexity and distinction, in part because of the influence of the Montosoli vineyard, which the Baricci family does not market as a 'cru' but could, from which 100% of these Sangiovese Grosso grapes come.

### Brunello di Montalcino, Fossacolle, 2020

98

Winemaker Adriano Bombagioni learned his craft under Giacomo Tachis, the single most famous winemaker Italy ever produced. Vines here come from 300 metres elevation from clay & limestone soils: ripe, full, rich, balanced, lingering Brunello.

### Brunello di Montalcino, Il Poggione, 2013

115

One of my favourite producers – Poggione always manages to combine pristine elegance and restraint with the wild, rustic character of powerful Brunello – and from an underrated, cooler vintage: light on its feet (for a Brunello), impeccable structure, red-fruited, lovely.

### Rosso di Montalcino, Il Poggione, 2022

60

From the same Brunello grapes as its older, more famous siblings above, but from younger vines and without as much aging, yet still bringing plenty of that Sangiovese Grosso character, this 'Baby Brunello' is open and lush and from a top, traditional producer.

### BOLGHERI, MAREMMA, 'SUPER TUSCANS'

It all started in 1968, when Piero Antinori decided to release commercially the Cabernet Sauvignon-based blend that he had made for family and friends. He called this wine Sassicaia, a wine produced entirely from non-native grapes, a category of Italian wine not supported by the new Italian wine laws (the DOC system, launched in 1966), and so this ground-breaking wine was labelled at the lowest tier an Italian wine could have: Vino da Tavola, table wine. But the wine, and the style, caught the eye of critics and consumers, and eventually a whole new tier in Italian wine law (IGT) would be created for this daring, revolutionary category of Italian wine (usually labelled Toscana IGT). Most of the wines below don't carry the prestigious DOCG labelling, but they don't care, and that's perhaps the best thing about them, the thing that makes them just a little extra delicious: they had a vision and crafted wines of quality, the way they wanted to, regardless of the lawmaking noise around them.

### Sassicaia, Tenuta San Guido, 2003\*

510

Sassicaia was initially categorised 'Vino da Tavola', and now it's the only wine in Italy to have its own DOC: Bolgheri Sassicaia DOC. And probably Italy's most famous wine, to boot. 85% Cabernet Sauvignon and 15% Cabernet Franc of dark, intense, shockingly coherent and balanced wine, from rocky, gravelly soils very similar to Bordeaux, on which the blend is based. An experience, and slice of history.

#### Ornellaia, Tenuta dell'Ornellaia, 1999\*

540

Piero Antinori's brother, Ludovico, set out in 1985 on his own project and created a blockbuster: Ornellaia, produced in the highly-regarded Bolgheri DOC, along the coast. The 1999 is 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, 30% Merlot, 5% Cabernet Franc, and they combine in what is a stunningly complete, full-bodied masterclass in concentration of flavour, in harnessing of structure and aromatics into one sip.

### Tignanello, Marchesi Antinori, 2015\*

310

The brainchild behind this Antinori masterpiece is Giacomo Tachis (who also produced Sassicaia), far and away the most famous winemaker Italy has ever produced. Tignanello was the first Sangiovese to be aged in barriques, the first red wine in the Chianti region that didn't use white grapes (which used to be the norm), by far the most influential IGT; Tignanello is a benchmark. 85% Sangiovese, 15% Cabernet Sauvignon in a wildly complex wine, combining finesse and Sangiovese's savoury feral side with dark, brooding fruits.

### Cepparello, Isole e Olena, 2015\*

180

This is a winery based in Chianti Classico whose most famous wine is a Toscana IGT: 100% Sangiovese from the estate's best sites, 400m in elevation on Galestro (a highly-valued schist-clay soil) where the Borro Cepparello, an old stream, originates, and lends its name to the wine. 100% barrel-aged for 20 months, a third in new oak, a third in second-use, and a third in third-use, all after extensive use of délestage. 'Burgundy'-style Sangiovese: elegance, red fruits, minerality, tertiary notes, ample fruit, and a bit of awe.

### Campora, Falchini, 1996

120

From San Gimignano, this is the estate's top red bottling: a Toscana IGT blend of 98% Cabernet Sauvignon, 2% Merlot; 4 years' aging, 2 in French oak and then 2 more in bottle. From the cooler 1996 vintage, still brimming with life and energy; full-bodied, fruity, earthy.

### Carnasciale, Podere Il Carnasciale, 2016\*

105

Have you ever heard of 'Caberlot'? I hadn't either. It's a legit grape, a crossing of Cabernet Franc and Merlot, and combines their qualities beautifully in this inky-black, concentrated wine, which leans a bit Cab Franc in terms of flavour. Magnificent at this age.

### Botrosecco Cabernet, Antinori Le Mortelle, 2022

94

Antinori's estate in Maremma DOC, southern Tuscany, a powerful blending of 60% Cabernet Sauvignon and 40% Cabernet Franc whose tannins are actually quite reined in for such a young age and so is wonderful to drink today, full of Cab character, and yearning for food.

### Terrine, Castello della Paneretta, 2016

89

Astonishing aromatics on this Toscana IGT blend of 50% Sangiovese and 50% Canaiolo, aged 2 years in a mixture of new and used oak.

Cannonau di Sardegna 'Bantu', Antichi Poderi Jerzu, 2022 Cannonau is the native name for Grenache, but from the Cannonau di Sardegna DOC, it's light-to-medium bodied, red fruited, extravagantly floral, and carries the island's signature rustic freshness. This version is easy-drinking, low in tannins, wonderful with food.	4
Cannonau di Sardegna Riserva 'Berteru', Cantina Gungui, 2017 Old vine, high-elevation Cannonau is fermented in steel and then aged in 30 hl casks for 12 months. Etna Rosso, Planeta, 2022 This wine is 100% Nerello Mascalese grapes, indigenous to the island and to Europe's most active volcano, Mount Etna, but the wine is labelled 'Etna Rosso' because it is the old, volcanic soil and the elevation of this DOC that the mountain provides (in this case, 600-800 metres above sea level) that make the wine just as much, if not more, than the grapes: minerality, smoke, exquisite balance, elegance.	64

Le Colombare is only produced in the best vintages, when Garganega 'ears' are left to dry for 5 months on bamboo cane mats. Only the free-run juice is used, which is aged 2 years in 25 hl acacia barrels.	9	72
Torcolato, Maculan, 2021 (500ml) From the wildly creative producer Maculan, Vespaiolo from the Breganze DOC are left to dry 4 months, then aged 1 year in French oak.	8	68

Vin Santo del Chianti 'Serelle', Ruffino, 2020 (375ml) Tuscany's most famous sweet wine, from the Vin Santo del Chianti DOC, Malvasia Bianca and Trebbiano Toscana are dried for 2 months, undergo a long fermentation in French oak, and then are aged in small barrels for 3 years before being blended and bottled.	7	52
Primitivo Dolce 'Arcano', Tenuta Giustini, 2023 (750ml)  Late-Harvest Primitivo, naturally high in sugars, are left on the vine to concentrate those sugars to produce a big, sweet, fruity wine.	7	58

Sauternes Premier Cru Classé, Château Suduiraut, 2003 (375ml) Sauternes is the most renowned of wines that utilise Botrytis Cinerea, or 'Noble Rot', a beneficial mould that is allowed to grow on the grapes to dehydrate them and to relay its own unique flavours into the wine. This comes from the ultra-famous Château Suduiraut, one of only 11 Châteaux to earn the 1er Cru Classé distinction in the famous 1855 Classification. From the 5-star 2003 vintage, this is a uniquely complex, tantalising dessert wine experience. 90% Semillon, 10% Sauvignon Blanc.	10	88
Sauternes Premier Cru Superieur Classé, Château d'Yquem, 2006 (375ml) If I had to guess what wine Jesus turned the water into at the wedding in Cana, I would guess Château d'Yquem Sauternes: the Noble Rot mould develops on the grape to impart flavour (from death to life, if you will), made in a sweet style (as most wines were in the ancient world), and from the only begotten Premier Cru Superieur estate in the famous Sauternes Classification of 1855, Château d'Yquem, a name that demands our worship. 80% Semillon, 20% Sauvignon Blanc, nectar of the gods, worthy of any special occasion.	-	380

Tokaji Azsú 5 Puttonyos, Grand Tokaj, 2019 (500ml)  'The Wine of Kings, and the King of Wines' as Tokaji Azsú has been known through antiquity, the first style of wine to utilise Noble Rot in its production, and with varying degrees of sweetness as measured by the number of 'Puttonyos', or baskets of dried grapes used per barrel of wine, so at 5 Puttonyos this wine has between 12 to 15% residual sugar.
