Italy contains 545 registered indigenous grape varieties, though it is estimated that there are over 2,000 throughout the country. There are so many, in fact, that we don't know the exact number, but there are more wine-making grapes native to the land we call Italy than any other country in the world. It is an absolute treasure trove of wine, and we will never cease to uncover its many vinous gems.

Of Italy's 20 distinct regions, every single one contains significant wine-growing areas (an aspect also unique to the country), spanning the length of this 1,200-kilometre peninsula that covers the mountainous regions of the north to the salt-blown coastal regions of the south, and every lush green foothill in between. An astonishing array of styles and colours and flavours are produced from these native grapes, most of which are not found anywhere else in the world.

At Divino, one of our highest goals - and one of my great responsibilities as Sommelier - is to bring these one-of-a-kind, rare, and distinctly Italian wines to your table, to provide as much access as possible to this panoply of wine variety and beauty. This is no easy feat, and not one that we take lightly. But boy, is it fun: every year, we taste hundreds of wines, bringing in only those we think are best, traveling to wineries to learn more about the source behind these gems, and bring it all back to you here, on this wine list, as well as the many events we host every year here at Divino including our tasting menus, bi-monthly wine tastings, Enomatic machine, wine flights, and the many other efforts we take to give you the chance to experience these wines of passion, history, geography, heart.

I hope, wherever you're at on your wine journey or whatever the nature of your visit to Divino today, that in the following pages you will find just the wine for whatever purpose you are looking for or, perhaps, that might just surprise you too. Wine is amazing by itself, better with food, and best with people, and our goal is to combine these elements in such a way as to provide you with the best possible experience, so if there's anything that I or a member of my amazing team can do to enhance your wine or your experience, please let us know.

A couple of points to keep in mind as you peruse this list:

- The wine world is replete with terminology requiring definition - too many to list here - so if you have a question or are unsure what a word or term means, just ask me or one of my colleagues.
- Wine labels (especially Italian ones) are notoriously difficult to understand, so each entry has a basic format: The Wine/Name of the Wine, Producer, Vintage.
- Italian wine is categorized into three tiers of Italian wine law that regulate how it's made (there is a fourth, Vino da Tavola, that does not appear on this list) and are indicated throughout this list by their acronym: the second-lowest tier, IGT (Indicazione Geografica Indica), then DOC (Denominazione d'Origine Controllata), and the highest tier, DOCG (Denominazione d'Origine Controllata e Garantita).

So, please, read through this list, be curious and adventurous and open, ask any question you want, read my descriptors and point out my spelling errors, have fun with it and with the extraordinary range of flavours and emotions that Italian wine evokes. Italian wine is a world all to its own, and it is our great privilege to bring you just this small slice of it.

Cheers to you, your loved ones, your meal, and may whatever you drink today bring all of that together even more than it already was.

Cristal Prestige Cuvée, Louis Roederer, 2013*

390

The 'Prestige Cuvée' of the legendary house, Louis Roederer. A blend of Grand Crus from old vines in Roederer's best vineyards and only made in the best vintages. 60% Pinot Noir, 40% Chardonnay.

Dom Pérignon, Moët & Chandon, 2013*

360

The story goes that the first time a monk named Dom Pérignon was able to ferment his wine twice, he got so excited that he called to his friends, 'Come quickly, I'm tasting the stars!' With seven years' aging on its lees, the old monk may have a point. 60% Chardonnay, 40% Pinot Noir.

Brut Réserve, Taittinger, NV

120

A blend of 35 Grand Cru and Premier Cru parcels, aged 4 years on its lees. 40% Chardonnay, 35% Pinot Noir, 25% Pinot Meunier. Refreshing, delicious, layered sparkling no matter how you pronounce it.

Special Cuvée, Bollinger, NV

130

An ambitious blend that combines harvest grapes (85% of which are from Grand Cru and Premier Cru vineyards) with Reserve wines in Magnums, some of which are up to 15 years old. 60% Pinot Noir, 25% Chardonnay, 15% Pinot Meunier.

ITALIAN SPARKLING

Italian sparkling wine is undergoing a silent, delicious revolution. The entries here cover three styles of sparkling (Franciacorta DOCG in Lombardia, Trentodoc DOC in Trentino-Alto Adige, and Alta Langa DOCG in Piemonte) that utilise the Champagne or 'traditional' method of production, where secondary fermentation occurs in individual bottles, rather than in tanks. Such wines are known for having a crisper structure and mouthfeel, more concentrated flavour, and finer, more lively bubbles, as though they're happy to be there.

TRADITIONAL METHOD

Franciacorta, Ferghettina, NV

78

Ferghettina's core sparkler, quintessential Franciacorta, aged 30 months on the lees. 85% Chardonnay, 15% Pinot Noir.

Franciacorta Rosé, Ferghettina, NV

91

Two days on the skins to extract colour, 36 months on the lees to extract flavour and texture. 80% Pinot Noir, 20% Chardonnay.

Trentodoc Brut Cuvée, Ferrari, NV

72

From the very first winery to produce Champagne-method sparklers in Trentodoc DOC, and with no relation to the car, though it just might get your heart racing: 20 months' aging on the lees and made entirely from Chardonnay grapes.

Alta Langa Millesimato Brut, Scrimaglio, 2021

65

The newest DOCG to hit the Italian sparkling scene is Alta Langa, where all sparklers are required to be Vintage wines by law. This effort by Scrimaglio is aged for 30 months on the lees. 80% Pinot Noir, 20% Chardonnay.

Prosecco Millesimato, Biscardo, 2024

43

Prosecco DOC is distinct from the above styles by its use of the Glera grape and its use of the Charmat Method, where secondary fermentation occurs in tank rather than bottle, resulting in a fruitier, softer, more forward style.

Prosecco Rosé Millesimato, Biscardo, 2024

43

A fruit-forward style of sparkling Rosé, whose colour comes from 15% Pinot Noir to round out the Glera grapes in the blend.

Frappato 'Rosæ', Pianogrillo, 2024

49

A short maceration of Frappato grapes lends a medium-hued, fragrant style rosé that bounces with peppers and florals and spice.

Cerasuolo d'Abruzzo, Valle Reale, 2021

44

A DOC devoted strictly to rosé production, Cerasuolo d'Abruzzo is 100% Montepulciano. The Valle Reale estate is situated at high elevation and this cool, gentle growing season, along with six months maturation on the lees, produces an elegant, fruity rosé.

Pinot Grigio Rosato, Cantina di Monteforte, 2024

38

Our palest rosé, from the Terre di Monteforte estate, which has some wonderful volcanic soils lending freshness and balance.

ORANGE

Ribolla Gialla Amfora, Gravner, 2014

148

What Andrea Pirlo was to the midfield, Josko Gravner is to orange-style wine: what everyone aspires to be, but never quite like the maestro himself. Ribolla Gialla grapes are left in contact with their skins in clay amphora for six months (six months!) in underground cellars and then aged in botti, above ground, for six years (six years!). In a category all its own.

Derthona Timorasso, Valli Unite, 2021

60

Spontaneous fermentation, low-intervention winemaking, stainless-steel maturation, and 100% Timorasso grapes from the Colli Tortonesi DOC produce a highly aromatic amber that evokes the quality and texture that Timorasso is known for as a white.

Pinot Grigio 'Pipinot', Scarbolo, 2023

51

From the Friuli Grave DOC where Pinot Grigio reigns, these grapes are macerated for three days and then matured for seven months in 20-hl casks, on their own lees and with bâtonnage, the result a smooth, elegant amber with florals, herbs, fruit.

Meursault Premier Cru Charmes, Henri Germain & Fils, 2006

120

From a small, 8-hectare family estate, the Germaines are blessed with deep underground cellars where they mature their Premier Crus, including this Charmes, for 20 months in used barrel, on the lees. The rich, elegant, flowery bouquet is a show-stopper.

Chablis Grand Cru Les Preuses, Domaine Chanson, 2011

99

Les Preuses, one of the seven climats of Chablis Grand Cru, is renowned for its power and concentration, beautifully delivered here after 14 months aging in barrel. Chanson's vines come from the center of the climat and deliver precision, minerality.

Chablis, Domaine de Vauroux, 2023

60

Four months' aging in steel on its lees, crisp structure and mouthfeel to go with typical Chablis minerality.

LOIRE VALLEY

Amboise Sec Le Clocher, Bonnigal-Bodet, 2023

67

A dry, single-vineyard, aromatic and medium-bodied expression of Chenin Blanc from 20 year-old vines on clay flint and kaolin soils in the Amboise region of the Loire Valley. Aging is entirely in steel and on its lees.

Pouilly-Fumé, Domaine Favray, 2024

59

A smoky, minerally, concentrated style of Sauvignon Blanc from the flinty soils typical of the area.

GERMANY

Riesling Dry Schieferkristall, Weingut Karthäuserhof, 2021

68

Karthäuserhof is the 8th-oldest winery in the world and has made a name for itself along the Mosel River and its tributaries for its piercing, fresh, minerally style of dry Riesling, this one from the Schieferkristall vineyard.

Riesling Kabinett Binger Scharlachberg, Weingut Riffel, 2021

54

Most German Riesling is produced with some residual sugar to buffer the searing acidity natural to the grape; this is a balanced, fruity, floral expression of that style so unique to German winemaking.

Godello 'Louro do Bolo' Valdeorras, Rafael Palacios, 2023

62

Godello nearly went extinct in the 1970s but is now a rising star in northwest Spain, especially in the hands of Palacios, one of the top producers in Valdeorras. Twenty-five year-old vines at 600 metres elevation, aged four months in 35-hl French oak foudres.

Albariño Family Estate Selection, Bodegas Castro Martin, 2022

46

The Atlantic Ocean batters the coast of northwest Spain and, in so doing, releases fog banks that deposit salt water onto Albariño grapes hanging on the vine that will soon express that fog in its salty, fresh, mineral style of white wine so beloved worldwide.

SLOVENIA

Ribolla, Marjan Simčič, 2023

55

From the Brda region, the primary appellation for Ribolla in Slovenia, and just the other side of the border from Friuli in Italy, where it is known as Ribolla Gialla. Forty-eight hours of skin-contact lend depth and expressiveness to this elegant style.

GREECE

Santorini Assyrtiko, Artemis Karamolegos, 2022

76

A concentrated, ashy expression of Assyrtiko, dense but without feeling heavy, with 5% each contributed from two other indigenous varieties, Athiri and Aidani. Five months aging in steel on the lees.

NEW ZEALAND

Sauvignon Blanc, Frost Pocket, 2023

48

The term 'frost pocket' refers to the conjunction where cooler temperatures meet ocean fog, producing this crisp, refreshing, and quintessential expression of Kiwi Sauvignon Blanc.

Chardonnay 'Lafóá', Colterenzio, 2023

96

Aging takes place in a combination of new and used oak but the style is a more lean, mineral, medium-bodied, style. Ten months aging on the lees, a further 6 months in bottle prior to release. Chablis on steroids.

Sauvignon 'Lafóá', Colterenzio, 2023

84

A brief cold soak on the skins, 8 months aging on the lees, and half of the wine fermented in oak barrels, yet the flavour is integrated, producing power, freshness, zest, complexity.

Gewürztraminer, Colterenzio, 2023

51

Dry Gewürztraminer, so that full-bodied unctuousness is pure fruit and winemaking. Aromatic, exotic, mouth-filling yet fresh.

Chardonnay Magred Cru, Nals Margried, 2022

62

Medium-bodied Chardonnay from a parcel the estate singled out for its white limestone gravel located at the foot of a gentle slope in the alpine foothills, aged three weeks in 30-hl barrels then another eight months on fine lees.

FRIULI-VENEZIA GIULIA

Friuli is possibly the most exciting white wine region in Italy right now, benefitting from some amazing soils that range from volcanic to pure limestone, from its adjacency to the Adriatic Sea, and from a menagerie of indigenous varieties that leave nothing on the table. Consistently, these are wines of dazzling elegance married to complexity of flavour that dances across the palate all by itself but also performs excellently with food, from cheese to fish to chicken.

Ciallabianco, Ronchi di Cialla, 2014

90

A blend of 60% Ribolla Gialla, 30% Verduzzo, 10% Picolit, all native to the Cialla Valley and entirely from the Cialla subzone of the Colli Orientali DOC. A wine of depth and complexity, showcasing that dance between richness and acidity.

Chardonnay, Vie di Romans, 2023

84

From Isonzo DOC, famous for its ponca soil, a mix of marl and sandstone. Nine months aging in barrel and on the lees, but they are just part of the ensemble of exotic fruit, minerality, toast, nuttiness, elegance.

Collio Riserva, Zuani, 2020

76

A radiant blend of Friulano, Pinot Grigio, Sauvignon Blanc, and Chardonnay, all sourced from Collio DOC's ponca soil. Fermented in steel and aged in French barriques for 10 months.

Friulano, Tenuta Stella, 2021

64

An aromatic and gorgeous expression of Friulano from 65 year-old vines in Collio DOC. Aged seven months in steel on fine lees.

Malvasia 'Dileo' Riserva, Castelveccchio, 2020

54

From Carso DOC, meaning 'rocky land' in Latin, a reference to the limestone soil that grape-growers can only dream of. This is a fruity, full-bodied expression of this storied grape, partially late-harvested and then aged in concrete. Complex and exotic.

Ribolla Gialla, Casali Roncali, 2024

48

Showcasing all of the floral, stony characteristics typical of the whites coming from Colli Orientali DOC, Ribolla Gialla grapes are harvested in the morning to retain acidity and then finished on the lees with regular bâtonnage. Fruity, elegant, smooth as you like.

Soave Classico La Rocca, Pieropan, 2024

74

La Rocca is a single vineyard located on the only limestone outcropping in Soave Classico DOC and helps to produce this layered, rich, concentrated, stunning example of Garganega.

Vespaiole, Maculan, 2022

55

Only about 100 HA worldwide are devoted to this ancient varietal, most of which are found in Breganze DOC, its homeland.

It is naturally high in both sugar and acidity, producing a combination of full-bodied fruitiness with a lively beam of acidity.

Pinot Grigio 'Monopolio', Cantina di Gambellara, 2025

40

Classic, fresh, hot-summer-day expression of Pinot Grigio from a cooperative of about 200 family-growers.

Soave Classico Superiore Vigneto Montegrando, Cantina di Monteforte, 2023

38

This bottling comes from the 4 HA of the Montegrando vineyard, one of Soave's 33 UGAs, lush with volcanic soils that deliver all the goods in this complex, fresh, classic Soave. Aged 12 months in 15-hl barrels.

LOMBARDIA

Lugana 'Cromalga', Corte Sermana, 2019

59

Some people go to Lake Garda for the villas; we go there for the wine.

Lugana is a DOC for the white Turbiana grape, a local and late-ripening varietal, located right off the lake's shores, which supplies climate-moderating winds and minerality.

Lugana Riserva 'Molceo', Ottella, 2021

74

Luxurious stuff from Lake Garda, combining concentration and a bit of weight with an acidity that punctures through it all. Whole-bunch fermentation, partial malolactic, then 16 months aging on lees in a combination of steel and large-format tonneaux.

PIEMONTE

Roero Arneis 'Pradalupo', Fontanafredda, 2023

52

Only half of the Arneis grapes are de-stemmed, resulting in an herbal touch to this fresh, fruity white from the Roero DOCG.

Derthona Timorasso 'Ca' degli Olmi', Luca Canevaro, 2022

63

Timorasso knows how Taylor felt in her song 'You Belong with Me': underappreciated, in the background, not noticed for what it offers, but when given the chance, reveals its elegance, complexity, and that it's what you've been looking for the whole time. From the limestone hills of Colli Tortonesi DOC, this comes from the estate's oldest vines and is aged 12 months on lees, in steel.

Gavi di Gavi 'La Minaia', Bergaglio, 2025

49

100% Cortese, 100% stainless steel, 100% from Gavi, 100% delicious.

Gavi Vigneto Ciapon, Bergaglio, 2022

56

A head-turning single-vineyard expression of Cortese that marries dried fruit flavours with earthy, smoky nuances. Grapes are left on the vine just slightly longer than the rest of harvest and then finished on the lees in barriques for six months.

Gavi Riserva Vigna della Rovere Verde, La Mesma, 2020

74

A single-vineyard based entirely on Old Vines from a small estate in Gavi; 18 months in concrete, then 18 months in bottle, a wine that demonstrates the stunning aging potential of Cortese, both before and after bottling.

Pigato, Laura Aschero, 2023

From the Riviera Ligure di Ponente DOC, located right in Cinque Terre country and devoted to Pigato, the local term for and expression of Vermentino.

A 24-hour cold maceration, then a short aging period in steel on fine lees. Fresh, salty, seasidey, lovely.

EMILIA-ROMAGNA

Albana di Romagna 'Giovinetta', Collesanti, 2023

Probably the most famous style to come out of Emilia-Romagna,

Albana grapes are harvested in the wee hours of the morning to retain that freshness, delicately piercing the fruit and heft of this flavourful white, the first white DOCG in all of Italy.

Vernaccia di San Gimignano, Castellani, 2024

In the shadows of San Gimignano's famous towers are some of the most important vines in Italy: its Vernaccia was the very first DOC in the country in 1966 (it is now DOCG) and holds a hallowed place in the hearts of Tuscans for its zesty, crisp flavours.

Vernaccia di San Gimignano Riserva Vigna a Solatio, Falchini, 2014

An extraordinary single-vineyard expression of Tuscany's hallowed white grape given a layer of nuance by the extra year in barrel; the grapes for this came from the very top of the hill, where the one-two punch of optimal sun exposure with cooling breezes is maximised; balanced, complex, exquisite.

UMBRIA

'Adarmando' Umbria Bianco, Tabarrini, 2023

A jaw-dropping drinking experience whether or not full-bodied, exotic, aromatic whites are your thing: 100% Trebbiano Spoletino grapes are cryomacerated for 2 days then aged on the lees, in steel, for a full year. No Malolactic, no oak, nothing like it.

Orvieto Classico Superiore, Antinori San Giovanni della Sala, 2023

A complex wine based on Grechetto, the main grape of Orvieto DOC:

50% Grechetto, 25% Procanico, 13% Viognier, 12% Pinot Bianco. Minimal intervention as everything is finished in steel with a few months of lees aging; fresh, lovely, medium-bodied.

Cervaro della Sala, Antinori Castello della Sala, 2022

Iconic Chardonnay and possibly the most famous to ever come out of Italy. Chardonnay grapes are harvested in the very early morning to preserve purity and acidity and then fermented (but not aged) in barrel for a few months when the remaining 15% of the wine is blended with the indigenous Grechetto, which sees only stainless steel, for further freshness and aromatics. A special wine.

Montefalco Bianco, Arnaldo Caprai, 2023

A lovely peppery, salty expression of a classic white blend of the Montefalco DOC: 60% Trebbiano Spoletino, 40% Chardonnay.

The Marche is the home to the Verdicchio grape, the region's top grape and one of the white grapes of Italy with the most potential in terms of style, quality, and ageability, and is a style that is likely to only grow and grow. Grapes are concentrated around 25 towns or 'Castelli' that boast limestone, hillside vineyards with excellent sun exposure and influence from the nearby Adriatic. Verdicchio is capable of piercing freshness as well as incredible complexity and ageability, and all of these traits are on display in our offerings here, some of the best white wine values in Italy.

Verdicchio dei Castelli di Jesi Classico Riserva 'Passolento', La Marca di S. Michele, 2017 70

The Riservas of Castelli di Jesi Verdicchio is DOCG, must be aged a minimum of 18 months, and with 'Passolento', this estate's top bottling, is aged 8 months in 10-hl Slavonian oak barrels and delivers incredible poise, complexity, and texture.

Verdicchio dei Castelli di Jesi Classico Superiore 'Kypra', Ca' Liptra, 2023 59

A stunning wine, combining the mineral freshness of the Castelli di Jesi DOC with a floral elegance in the style of Burgundy; from the estate's best vineyards, 40 to 50 year-old vines, refined in cement tanks. Excellent pairing with cheese and John Coltrane.

Verdicchio dei Castelli di Jesi Classico Superiore, Villa Bucci, 2024 48

Forty year-old vines from limestone-rich clay soils produce a Verdicchio of dazzling elegance, freshness, and complexity.

Pecorino, Ville Le Querce, 2024 42

Fragrant and fruity Pecorino from the Falerio DOC, aged in cement to retain the grape's friendly, crisp character.

ABRUZZO

Trebbiano d'Abruzzo Vigneto di Popoli, Valle Reale, 2021 85

An eye-popping single-vineyard expression aged in stainless steel for 18 months using wild yeasts, from a small, family-owned winery. The vineyard, Popoli, is situated in front of an old Benedictine cellar and produces grapes of clarity, intensity, grace.

Trebbiano d'Abruzzo, Gran Sasso, 2024 39

Gran Sasso is the name of this winery as well as Abruzzo's most famous mountain that shields the vines from cold, Apennine winds but allows in just enough to keep the grapes from overripening in the hot summer months; fresh, citrusy, bright.

Pecorino d'Abruzzo Superiore 'La Canaglia', Fontefico, 2023 53

From the Terre di Chieti subregion of the Abruzzo DOC, this comes from the Vigna Bianca plot, just 1 kilometre from the sea, and lights up the palate with vivid minerality and a zing of acidity and that seems to reverberate; 48 hours on the skins, 6 months on the lees.

CAMPANIA

Fiano di Avellino Pietramara, I Favati, 2022 57

A lively, nutty, single-vineyard expression of one of the great white wines of Italy from one of the great producers in Campania. A short maceration on the lees but no extended aging. Exquisite mouthfeel, a touch of florals, elegant as hell, from high-elevation vineyards.

Greco di Tufo Terrantica, I Favati, 2022 61

Tufo is the name of the soil composed of volcanic ash from the Vesuvius (and other) eruptions compacted over time. Six months lees aging; a fruity, smoky, peppery, mineral single-vineyard expression.

Falaghina Beneventano, Cantina Sanpaolo, 2023 44

Vines for this indigenous grape come from the lower-lying hills of Beneventano, where weather is warmer and drier, providing some punch to Falaghina's natural crisp, citrusy, mineral side. Six months' aging in steel on fine lees.

BASILICATA

Il Preliminare, Cantine del Notaio, 2021

A medium-bodied white blend from a region and IGT, Basilicata, more known for its reds: 30% Aglianico grapes (a red) are pressed off the skins and accompanied by 30% Chardonnay, 20% Malvasia Bianca, 20% Moscato.

Verdeca 'Talo', San Marzano, 2023

My cat, Bucket, reminds me of Verdeca: chill, playful, full of energy, a little mysterious, expresses itself to you on its own terms, and absolutely loves fish. To add some personality, the wine rests for 3 months in barrel.

CALABRIA

Pecorello, Ippolito 1845, 2024

Pecorello is native to Calabria, the southernmost point of mainland Italy, and produces distinctly fruity, exotic, and minerally wines and you can just, just, get a whiff of the nearby Ionian Sea.

SARDEGNA

Vermentino di Gallura Superiore, Sella & Mosca, 2023

From the only DOCG on Sardinia, replete with the granite soils unique to the area; this is an enticing, suave rendition of Vermentino with an impeccable mouthfeel and zing of acidity, lending freshness to the fruity, aromatic core.

SICILIA

Chardonnay, Planeta, 2024

An apex and now legendary Chardonnay: 40% new oak, 30% second-use, 30% third-use. Sensual, deep, luxurious stuff from the shores of Lake Menfi.

Grillo, Vigneti Zabu', 2025

Good luck finding a Trattoria anywhere on the island that doesn't have an option for this indigenous, fruity, medium-bodied white.

Sauvignon Blanc 'Urro di Mare', Mandrarossa 2024

From clay-limestone soils a stone's throw from the sea, this is coastal, minerally, fully ripe Sauvignon Blanc as only Sicily could produce. Urro di Mare is a reference to the vineyard area of Menfi, within the larger Sicilia DOC, right off the shores of the Mediterranean.

MOUNT ETNA

Etna Bianco 'Aedes', I Custodi, 2023

Fruit from 10 year-old bush vines, aged in stainless steel, remarkable concentration: smoke, minerals, zest, delicate acidity.

Etna Bianco Contrada Taccione, Planeta, 2022

Grapes come from a single Contrada, the Etna equivalent to a 'cru', and is finished in 20% new oak, adding a subtle touch of body and flavour to the typicity of Etna's smokiness, minerality, pepper, acidity.

Etna Bianco Superiore Contrada Caselle 'Imbris', I Custodi, 2021

There's a real Burgundian poise and elegance to this gorgeous bottling, sourced at 900 metres in Milo, and aged for two years on lees, in steel, and another two years of refinement in bottle. Herbs, flowers, pepper spice, wool, ash, bliss.

BURGUNDY

You will see the influence of Burgundy throughout this wine list: it was Cistercian monks in the 1300s that first discovered that wine made in the same way with the same grapes tasted different if they came from a different vineyard. Those monks measured out some of the most reliable vineyards in the world, and to this day, Burgundians rank the quality of their vineyards based in large part on what these monastic farmers measured out centuries ago. Monks really know their booze.

La Tâche Grand Cru, Domaine de la Romanée-Conti, 1970 4,800

Well, here we are. There's not much to be said here that hasn't already been said about this winery, probably the most renowned in the world, or this vineyard, La Tâche, owned entirely by the Domaine and the largest of their vineyards at 6.06 HA. It is slightly higher in elevation than Romanée-Conti - the other monopole of the Domaine and the only other vineyard in Burgundy/the world that could compete in terms of fame and complete deliciousness - which gives wines from La Tâche a particularly robust structure and ageability. The 1970 vintage started out cool but warmed up into the fall, ensuring a long growing season, and La Tâche was listed by Decanter as being one of the wines from the region to be 'very good' in the long-term from an otherwise challenging growing season. Perhaps the peak of red Burgundy, an experience, a lifetime wine.

Pommard Premier Cru Clos Micault, Héritiers de Baudricourt, 2009 106

A wine of substance as well as delicacy, elegance as well as a bit of power, as only a proper Pommard could provide. Eighteen months aging in French barriques, 30% of which was new.

Saint-Aubin Premier Cru Sur le Sentier du Clou Vieilles Vignes, Henri Prudhon, 2009 98

Saint-Aubin is an underrated darling of the Côtes de Beaune and Prudhon is one of the commune's most reliable producers, crafting a gorgeously floral, fragrant 1er Cru here from 80 year-old vines. Aged for 18 months in used oak.

Morgon 'Côte du Py', Jean-Marc Burgaud, 2024 59

From eight hectares of blue, disintegrated schist from the Côte du Py hill, Gamay grapes get the royal treatment from one of the top producers in Morgon. Whole-bunch fermentation, bottling in the spring: pepper, minerals, bramble, a deep, serious expression.

BORDEAUX

Saint-Estèphe, Ormes de Pez, 2016 88

Saint-Estèphe is technically a Left Bank commune (where blends are Cab-dominated), but this wine is led by Merlot: 52%, then 42% Cabernet Sauvignon, 5% Cabernet Franc, 1% Petit Verdot. Rich and complex, well-aged Bordeaux.

Margaux Deuxième Cru, Château Lascombes, 1990 210

This is why we play the game, for wines like this. 75% Cabernet Sauvignon, 20% Merlot, 5% Petit Verdot, from one of the 14 estates awarded Deuxieme Cru status in the 1855 Classification of Medoc; a ridiculous wine, packing flavour upon flavour onto each sip, from fruits to minerals to herbs we've never even heard of, all delivered with aged Bordeaux's restrained power.

St.-Emilion Grand Cru, Château Carteau, 2005 94

On the right bank, where Merlot is king: 90% Merlot, 10% Cabernet Franc. Fruity, full-bodied, a touch of earth and aged magic.

LOIRE VALLEY

Saumur Rouge, Brendan Stater-West, 2023 71

Phenomenally aromatic, old-vine Cabernet Franc that spends 12 months in neutral oak barrels (225L, 300L, and 400L), six months in stainless steel, and displays Saumur's magical soils all at the same time.

CORSICA

Le Clos Rouge 'Clos Venturi', Domaine Vico, 2020 80

It's hard to not include Corsican wine on an Italian-themed wine list - the former Italian territory is now politically part of France but the place names, and many of the grapes, are of Italian origin, including those used for this stunning, meaty, complex yet elegant blend, partially whole-bunch fermented and aged for 18 months in 40-hl barrels after a 45-day maceration of 70% Sciaccarellu (Tuscany's 'Mammolo'), 20% Niellucciu (local term for Sangiovese), and 10% Carcaghjolu.

Cornas La Sabarotte, Domaine Courbis, 2006

134

Imagine a wine with a flavour profile of dark fruits, minerality, cured meat, smoke, flowers, blood, pepper, spice. All in the same wine! That is Syrah from Cornas.

This 2006 is a single-vineyard bottling by Courbis, one of the most hallowed of Cornas producers; 70% was aged in oak, 30% of which was new.

Hermitage Les Dionnières, Fayolle Fils & Fille, 2012*

84

Syrah grapes for this wine come from 70 year-old vines from the lieu-dit Dionnières, a site rich in granite that lends a remarkable mineral quality to go with

Syrah's other benchmarks: pepper, dark fruits, spice, and aged one year in barrel.

Châteauneuf-du-Pape, Le Pierrey, 2013

99

The low yields, cold spring, and extended growing season of 2013 produced a highly structured, aromatic style of Châteauneuf that depended more on Syrah and Mourvèdre than it did Grenache: red-fruited, aromatic, with plenty of full body and garrigue.

Gigondas La Colline, Domaine des Bosquets, 2022

91

La Colline is on a slope of the Dentelles de Montmirail range that shapes so much of the terroir of this excellent estate, exposing grapes to the sun and cooling winds.

100% Grenache and a just beautiful, site-driven expression with florals, red fruits, and sun.

SPAIN

Rioja Gran Reserva, Finca Manzanos, 2015

69

From clay-limestone soils at 400 metres above sea level, this Tempranillo saw a whopping 8 years of aging:

3 years in barrel (70% French, 30% American), and then 5 years in bottle.

Rioja Reserva, Bodegas Pacogarcia, 2016

53

Tempranillo in its sweet spot of red fruits with oak and baking spice, supplemented with 10% Graciano; aged two years in oak, combining French and American as well as new and used oak, and then a further two years in bottle.

Goumenissa, Domaine Chatzivaritis, 2021

64

Sexy stuff, this, an indigenous blend of 70% Xinmavro and 30% Negoska, sourced from the sandy-clay soils of Fyliria in the renowned Goumenissa PDO, an elegant, savoury, structured style of wine that should be more well-known than it is.

Malbec 'Selección de la Familia', Humberto Canale, 2022

56

Equal parts fruity and spicy, with Malbec's bewitching ability to combine red and dark fruit flavours, this is layered, full-bodied stuff and the estate's top bottling, from high-elevation vineyards in Patagonia, aged for 12 months in French and American oak.

From the southernmost wine region in the world, Central Otago brings a stunning floral, herbal side to Pinot Noir; this example by Wild Earth captivates with its fruit, minerality, and cool-climate acidity.

BAROLO

There is just no red wine like Barolo, a spellbinding wine that combines a light to medium-bodied weight with balanced yet serious structure, tannins & acidity that together deliver a bonkers mouthfeel while also demanding that it be served with food or, at least, a little contemplation. Barolo famously, as well as its Barbaresco counterpart over the hill (& on the next page), has been legally divided into individual vineyards ('cru' is the commonly used but unofficial term), all of which will appear on the label if all of the grapes in the wine come from that cru, resulting in hundreds of distinct & delicious expressions of the noble Nebbiolo grape, capable of incredible complexity, elegance, & awe.

Barolo Cascina Francia, Giacomo Conterno, 2018*

410

Conterno is a wizard with Nebbiolo & his Monfortino is one of the most famous Barolos ever produced, but in 2018 he decided to forego the Monfortino & instead blended those barrels in with his Cascina Francia. A special bottling, & a special wine.

Barolo Cannubi, Giacomo Brezza, 2020*

108

The 'Grand Cru' of Barolo is widely considered to be Cannubi, Piemonte's most famous vineyard that sits smack in the heart of the Barolo zone, the surrounding hills shielding it from extreme weather & allowing the grapes to reach optimal ripeness & complexity with a long, peaceful growing season. From a traditional producer, Brezza: elegant, approachable, ravishing.

Barolo Vigna La Rosa, Fontanafredda, 2021*

140

You have to walk the plot of La Rosa - an awe-inducing amphitheatrical subplot of the Fontanafredda MGA - to find the wildflower that gives its distinctive, spicy aroma to this, one of my favourite notes I've ever found in a wine. Aged 24 months in French botti.

Barolo Vigna Le Rocche Riserva, Bruno Giacosa, 2001*

1,800

A wine only made in the very best of vintages & that regularly competes as the best of Italy, Le Rocche is the top wine from one of the region's top wizards, Giacosa, from one of the most valued sites in Serralunga d'Alba, whose reputationally high tannins help ensure a long life, which is just what this iconic wine was designed for, aged entirely in large, untoasted botti for three years.

Barolo Coste di Rose, G.D. Vajra, 2021*

122

A gorgeous nose transports you right to the commune of Barolo, where this prized cru originates, located beside the legendary Cannubi cru & right below a forest, which moderates temperature & ensures slow, even ripening. Fragrant & poised.

Barolo Cannubi, E. Pira & Figli, 2016*

290

Winemaker Chiara Boschis purchased this winery in 1990 & has proceeded to establish herself as one of Barolo's best. Her 0.7 hectare plot in the Cannubi 'grand cru' is complex & poised, delivered with Barolo's typical teeter-totter of power with finesse.

Barolo Cannubi Riserva, Gianni Gagliardo, 2004*

198

A refined, delicate treatment of Barolo's most esteemed cru, Cannubi, aged for six years in large Slavonian oak & then finished in bottle another six months. The expression here is less of power & more of finesse, perfume, & elegance.

Barolo Parussi, Massolino, 2020*

174

Massolino is one of those producers with an esteemed reputation across the Langhe & makes a strong argument for such high regard with this Parussi cru, which wears the Massolino badge of power, balance, & a staggering panoply of flavour.

Barolo, Fratelli Oddero, 1967*

390

From a time when the Cru system as it is today didn't even exist, & when fully-ripened Barolo could clock in at 13.5% ABV, Oddero wines are famously age-worthy, & this comes from the 5-star 1967 vintage, one of the best of the century in Barolo.

Barolo 'Undicicommuni', Arnaldo Rivera, 2013*

86

A blend of grapes coming from each of the eleven communes ('undici comuni' in Italian) that constitute the Barolo zone, a collaborative effort of many farmers coming together, the fullness of the Barolo zone in one bottling.

Barolo Bussia Riserva 'Costa di Bussia', Tenuta Arnulfo, 2019*

94

Bussia is the second-largest cru in the region at 340 hectares, so it has many expressions, here with an added layer of body & complexity with the extra year of Riserva aging: 36 months in Slavonian oak, then two years in bottle. Layered & beautiful stuff.

Barolo Vigna Rionda, Luigi Oddero, 2004*

155

A refined, herbal Barolo from one of the most historic properties in Barolo - note the 1967 'Fratelli Oddero' above - aged for 40 months in 30 & 50-hl Slavonian casks, taming the tannins of Serralunga d'Alba & delivering layer upon layer of flavour.

Barolo Monprivato, Giuseppe Mascarello, 1999* 480

One of the top sites in Castiglione Falletto, Monprivato is only bottled by Mascarello in the best vintages & here crafted one of the highest-rated Barolos of the last decades, concentrating all the best fruit from the plot & aging it 30 months in Slavonian oak.

Barolo Riserva, Giacomo Borgogno, 1973* 330

A legendary name, crafting age-worthy wines since the 1700s, Borgogno is the longest continually-running winery in Barolo. Their Riserva receives traditional treatment, aging only in large-format Slavonian oak barrels, with hypnotically elegant results.

BARBARESCO

Only twenty kilometres from the village of Barolo lies the town of Barbaresco, on the other side of Alba, where the hills don't reach quite as high & so are a bit warmer, & the soils a bit more fertile, meaning the grapes don't experience as much stress, the growing season a bit shorter. The wines that result from this environment don't have the tannic bite or power of Barolo, & so Barbaresco DOCG's reputation was set in place as being the more elegant, approachable style of Nebbiolo, but still perfectly capable of going toe-to-toe in terms of complexity, flavour profile, & that inescapable wow factor that well-made Nebbiolo induces from its drinkers. Barbaresco also abides by the cru system, so vineyard names will occur after the village name, no small number of them considered among the best single-site vineyards in Italy.

Barbaresco Sorì San Lorenzo, Angelo Gaja, 1986* 470

In the world of Barbaresco, there is no name that has reached the heights of Angelo Gaja, & it shows in the bottles on offer here, starting with one of the most famous vineyards he works, Sorì San Lorenzo, released in 1967 & the first single-vineyard Barbaresco ever produced, a south-facing amphitheatre packed with pedigree, awe, & grace.

Barbaresco Asili Riserva, Bruno Giacosa, 2014* 520

Asili is widely considered the top MGA in Barbaresco - the hill it sits on is undulating, protected from weather extremes, & has a blue calcareous sandy marl composition unique in the region - but the real star here is the 'Genius of Neive', Bruno Giacosa, one of the pioneers of single-site Barbaresco; their Riserva is aged for 20 months in untoasted barrel, delivering complex, iconic fruit.

Barbaresco, Angelo Gaja, 2019* 340

You know that scene in *Gladiator* when Juba, Maximus's friend, first sees the Colosseum & says, 'I did not know man could build such things?' That is how I feel when I drink this wine, a blend of Gaja's best sites, aged one year in barrique, one year botti.

Barbaresco Rabaja, Bruno Rocca, 2020* 190

Rabaja is one of the most esteemed crus in the Barbaresco zone, with a soil combining clay, limestone, tuff, & marl, resulting in a wine similarly layered & multifaceted, yet woven together with such grace & seamlessness as only the Rocca family can do.

Barbaresco Roncaglie Riserva, Socré, 2015 120

The estate's most prized cru, Roncaglie, given an extra dose of aging, from the excellent, & warm, 2015 vintage. The extra year in barrel pushes this on the rich side of Barbaresco yet it's laced with savoury freshness, like tinsel across a Christmas tree.

Barbaresco Baluchin Riserva, Cocito, 2013* 135

Sourced from the highest part of Bric Micca, a cru of clay-sandy soils, so the cool climate from this high-elevation site lends a taut, precise acidity to complement the 22 months aging in oak, 10% of which was new barrel. Exquisite now & with room to grow.

Barbaresco Ovello, Cascina Morassino, 2021* 99

This is classic Barbaresco - spice, finesse, red fruits, flowers - with an extra dose of body lent to it by the high proportion of clay found in the soil of Ovello, one of the top crus in Barbaresco, & it doesn't hurt to have the pedigreed hand of Morassino behind it all.

Barbaresco, Socré, 2019* 84

Socré was founded as a winery in 1869, continues to be run within the same family, & have been sculpting wines of elegance, complexity, & precision now for over 150 years. This is a blend of their estate grapes & is properly hitting its stride.

Gattinara, Giacomo Conterno-Nervi, 2017

Roberto Conterno is a legend in Barolo but in the 2010s he purchased Gattinara DOCG's most famous estate, Nervi, to capitalise on the cooler, volcanic vines of Nebbiolo (locally known as Spanna).

Conterno usually bottles his individual vineyards but in 2017 he decided to combine them all, so this punches above its normal weight. Cracking value.

Ghemme, Paride Chiovini, 2017

85

Just across the highway from Gattinara lies the district of Ghemme, whose hills are of alluvial origin and produce a style of Spanna in a brighter, herbal, more ethereal style. Aged 18 months in 5-hl French tonneaux.

LANGHE, MONFERRATO

Langhe Nebbiolo, Ernesto Molino, 2024

62

This is an enticingly elegant rendition of the remarkable Nebbiolo grape, given one year aging in barrel: finesse and complexity.

Nebbiolo d'Alba Vigna Santa Rosalia, Giacomo Brezza, 2023

71

From a 1.2 hectare, west-facing plot, the potpourri on this wine is just ridiculous, a gorgeous array of florals, leather, and red fruits, aged for 12 months in large Slavonian oak barrels.

Langhe Nebbiolo Sito Moresco, Gaja, 2021

128

Gaja bought vineyards in Treiso and Serralunga d'Alba from the Moresco family and named this blend of 50% Nebbiolo, 40% Barbera, and 10% Merlot after them.

There's plenty of juiciness and fruitiness here but this is poised, elegant, savoury, and light on its feet.

Barbera di Nizza Bansella, Prunotto, 2021

74

A lovely single-vineyard expression of Barbera from Nizza, the newest DOCG for Barbera (awarded in 2014), where the vineyards are hillier and have higher concentrations of sand. Nine months' aging in small barrel.

Barbera d'Asti Superiore 'Magister', Cantine di Nizza, 2022

47

Barbera as its fullest, darkest, fruitiest self. In Alba, the best sites are devoted to Nebbiolo, but in Asti, this privilege belongs to Barbera and is part of the reason Barbera d'Asti is a DOCG. From calcareous clay soils and prime south-facing slopes.

Barbera d'Alba Superiore, Malabaila, 2020

64

Excellent Barbera for its depth, nuance, and layers upon layers of flavour; from the Alba district and DOC, where Barbera is typically more structured and masculine, this is a cracking mix of savoury backbone with Barbera's signature dark fruits and spice.

Barbera d'Alba Vigna Francia, Giacomo Conterno, 2019

108

Most of the best plots in Barolo are planted to Nebbiolo, but Conterno releases several Barbera's from these cherished sites, none more dazzlingly potent, elegant, or nuanced than this from the Francia cru in Serralunga, aged 20 months in large botti.

Dolcetto d'Alba Bricco Bastia, Conterno Fantino, 2022

51

Dolcetto is what Piedmontese winemakers drink when they're not making Barolo; round, supple, fruity, entirely satisfying. This is a lush, single-vineyard bottling, accented by florals and a lovely, soft acidity.

Chianti is divided into eight subzones, the most famous of which is Chianti Classico DOCG, which is the central, older, and hillier of the subzones, as well as where loads of those ridiculously romantic photos of cypress-lined roads come from. It is known for its Albarese soil, limestone and clay, which contribute acidity and structure, and as a result these wines bring that blast of freshness to go with its rustic, cherry, countryside frame. The quintessential wine of Tuscany and the most legendary Sangiovese worldwide.

Chianti Riserva, Bonacchi, 2021 46

A lovely, layered introduction to the endless wonders of Chianti, 100% Sangiovese aged for two years in barrel.

Chianti Classico Riserva, Castello di Meleto, 2021 62

Imagine a Tuscan hillside with wildflowers all around and an ancient clay pot sticking out of the red, iron-laced dirt nearby, wild tomato vines trying to sprout. That is this wine. Includes 5% Merlot, but it's the Sangiovese that sings: 20 months in 54 hl barrels and concrete.

Chianti Classico Riserva, Castello della Paneretta, 2020 70

Special Sangiovese reinforced by a local grape, Canaiolo (10%), as well as one of the best estates in Monsanto, this Chianti Classico is aged for two years in 50 and 30 hectolitre barrels and delivers vivid, tantalising flavours.

Chianti Classico Gran Selezione Vigna Monna Lisa, Vignamaggio, 2017 83

Aged 30 months in a combination of small French and large Slavonian oak barrels, this is 100% Sangiovese and Vignamaggio's top bottling, displaying wonderful concentration, power, intensity, with this gorgeous, feral edginess to it.

Chianti Classico Gran Selezione Castellina 'Le Prese', Sergio Zingarelli, 2020 95

It is hard to imagine a more quintessential, delicious, or awe-inducing expression of the Chianti hills than what the Zingarelli family have crafted here from the Le Prese plot on their Rocca delle Macie estate. A 31-day maceration is followed by 20 months aging in 25-hl French barrels, refined in bottle a further 18 months, and comes flying out of the gate with flavour, pomp, and elegance.

Chianti Rufina Riserva Vigneto Bucerchiale, Selvapiana, 2022 72

If Chianti Classico is the popular, good-looking older sibling that gets all the attention, Rufina is the less outgoing, less well-known younger sibling that's just as compelling. The smallest and coolest of the Chianti subzones, where aromatics and single-vineyard bottlings are prioritised. This is a stunning effort from the Bucerchiale cru: finesse, fragrance, freshness.

MONTEPULCIANO

Renaissance-era nobility adored the wines of Montepulciano so much that they requested that plantings of the grape - a biotype of Sangiovese known as Prugnolo Gentile - be increased, so the grape was planted in the Peligna Valley in Abruzzo, where local farmers referred to it as 'that Montepulciano grape' and the moniker stuck, resulting in the mass confusion, to this day, between the wines of the Montepulciano grape in Abruzzo and the wines of the Montepulciano town in Tuscany, one of the great DOCGs for Sangiovese in Italy. Once you account for the unlucky name, however, what you get is a more aromatic and rounded style of Sangiovese, coupled with extraordinary aromatics, balance, and depth. Wine fit for a king, it turns out.

Vino Nobile di Montepulciano, Tenuta Valdipiatta, 2020 71

One of those wines they should make a candle out of. Prugnolo Gentile with 15% Canaiolo and aged 18 months in barrel.

Vino Nobile di Montepulciano Vigna d'Alfiero, Tenuta Valdipiatta, 2019 86

From the estate's most treasure vineyard, planted in the 1960s and produced only in exceptional years, this is 100% Prugnolo Gentile macerated for 4 weeks, aged for 18 months in large barrels, and refined in bottle another year.

Vino Nobile di Montepulciano Riserva, Il Macchione, 2016 106

Pure Sangiovese glory here, 100% Prugnolo Gentile aged for 36 months in large barrels that seem to only help the Sangiovese along towards what it does best: savoury, complex, meaty power reined in by Tuscan rusticity and finesse.

Montalcino is a walled town sitting on the precipice of a hill, which is no small metaphor. The wines here garner international fame and are considered some of the best Italy has to offer, based on a clone of Sangiovese called Brunello, a thicker-skinned version of Italy's most-planted grape. There is more limestone around Montalcino, and the Monte Amiata range to the southeast protects the region from sudden rain or hail. At its best, Brunello di Montalcino DOCG is a richly flavoured tour de force that beckons us to slow down and notice the many things it can do to our palates, capable of aging as well as wowing us right now.

Brunello di Montalcino, Canalicchio di Sopra, 2019* <i>Bombastic and beautiful Brunello. La Casaccia is one of the two 'crus' the estate owns, and this bottling is a combination of Casaccia's iron-laced galestro soil with the concentrated, silty soil of Montosoli, the other cru. Four-week maceration and 36 months aging in Slavonian oak doles out red fruit, meatiness, savoury nuance, and devastating elegance.</i>	140
Brunello di Montalcino, Conti Costanti, 2020 <i>Such is Andrea Costanti's pursuit of quality that he intentionally sat out the sub-par 2014 vintage because he didn't believe in its potential. When he does make wine, it makes headlines: 36 months aging in a mix of Allier tonneaux & 30 hl casks, including contact with the lees. Changes & benefits significantly with air, so we recommend a decant.</i>	162
Brunello di Montalcino Riserva, Biondi-Santi, 2010* <i>In 1842, Feruccio Biondi Santi isolated a clone of the Sangiovese grape that became known as Sangiovese Grosso, or 'Brunello', and their expression of this grape has only grown: fiery, elegant, structured, a mouthfeel almost as legendary as the family name. Grapes for the Riserva come strictly from vines over 25 years old, from their own clone, and aged 6 years, 3 in Slavonian botti.</i>	780

Rosso di Montalcino, Il Poggione, 2023 <i>From the same Brunello grapes as its older, more famous siblings above, but from younger vines and without as much aging, yet still bringing plenty of that Sangiovese Grosso character, this 'Baby Brunello' is open and lush and from a top, traditional producer.</i>	62

The power and tannins of Cabernet Sauvignon combine with the savoury spine of Sangiovese in this full-bodied, historic blend, a DOCG that was the very first appellation in all of Italy allowed, by law, to blend in Cabernet.

ELBA

Elba Rosso Riserva 'Ginevra', Tenuta La Chiusa, 2019

Yes, even the tiny island of Elba, just off Tuscany's coast, produces wine. This is a fine, herbal, red-fruited Riserva, 60% Sangiovese and 40% Merlot, from vines near sea-level on clay soils. One year aging in barriques, one year refinement in bottle.

Piero Antinori's brother, Ludovico, set out in 1985 on his own project & created a blockbuster: Ornellaia, produced in Bolgheri DOC, along the coast. The 1999 is 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, 30% Merlot, 5% Cabernet Franc, & they combine in what is a stunningly complete, full-bodied masterclass in concentration of flavour, in harnessing of structure & aromatics into one sip.

Tignanello, Marchesi Antinori, 2016*

310

From winemaker Giacomo Tachis (who also made Sassicaia), Tignanello was the first Sangiovese to be aged in barriques, the first red wine in Chianti that didn't use white grapes; Tignanello is a benchmark. 80% Sangiovese, 15% Cabernet Sauvignon, & 5% Cabernet Franc in a wildly complex wine, combining finesse & Sangiovese's savoury feral side with dark, brooding fruits.

Solaia, Marchesi Antinori, 2003*

680

During the 1978 harvest, Antinori had a surplus of Cabernet Sauvignon grapes leftover from making Tignanello (see above entry), so decided to bottle them on their own. He called this wine Solaia, which has become one of the most sought-after bottlings on the planet; 75% Cabernet, 20% Sangiovese, 5% Cabernet Franc: herbs & tobacco & power & dark, luscious fruits.

Guidalberto, Tenuta San Guido, 2019*

145

The second label of the estate responsible for Sassicaia, wine of legends, this is a serious Bordeaux blend of 60% Cabernet Sauvignon & 40% Merlot, kissed with Tyrrhenian mists & 15 months of oak aging, mostly French but also 20% American.

Poggio al Lupo, Tenuta Sette Ponti, 2004*

170

An exotic, complex wine based primarily on Cabernet Sauvignon with support from Alicante & Petit Verdot from Maremma DOC, near the coast, which provides the acidity to support this bold, aged, funky, full-bodied beast.

'Caiarossa', Caiarossa, 2016*

130

A wine that combines tradition, innovation, & the exotic. Seven varietals - 42% Cabernet Franc, 25% Merlot, 15% Syrah, 6% Cabernet Sauvignon, 6% Petit Verdot, 5% Sangiovese, & 1% Alicante - are vinified & aged separately for 20 months in French tonneaux, then blended & finished for six months in concrete. A dizzying array of texture, flavour, style.

Carnasciale, Podere Il Carnasciale, 2013*

Have you ever heard of 'Caberlot'? I hadn't either. It's a legit grape, a crossing of Cabernet Franc & Merlot, & combines their qualities beautifully in this intensely, concentrated wine, which leans a bit Cab Franc in terms of flavour. Magnificent at this age.

Cabernet Sauvignon 'Farnito', Carpineto, 2020*

79

Cabernet grapes are sourced in the Chianti region & you can feel its touch in this otherwise classic Cab Sauv, aged for 18 months in French & American oak & generous in its gifts of red & dark fruits, spice, leather, & structure to last.

Il Seggio, Poggio al Tesoro, 2023

68

A full, rich example of Bolgheri DOC, blending 50% Merlot, 20% Cabernet Sauvignon, 20% Cabernet Franc, & 10% Petit Verdot, from vines at sea level that are cooled by the Tyrrhenian, aged for 15 months in 30% new & 70% used Allier barriques.

Cepparello, Isole e Olena, 2015*

220

Iconic Sangiovese from the estate's best sites in Chianti, 400m in elevation on Galestro (a schist-clay soil), barrel-aged for 20 months, a third in new oak, a third in second-use, & a third in third-use, all after extensive delestage. 'Burgundy'-style Sangiovese: elegance, red fruits, minerality, flowers for days.

Flaccianello della Pieve, Fontodi, 2011*

290

Released in 1981 as the latest in a small yet increasingly famous group of rebels against the local DOC regulations, Flaccianello seeks, & achieves, as pure an interpretation of the noble Sangiovese grape as you're likely to find, aged 24 months in barrique, power combining with silk & energy & ageability.

The best bunches from harvest are sorted for this wine, which then matures for 16 months in barrel, followed by 6 months in bottle. An exquisite mouthfeel to this, at this age sitting in a sweet spot. 60% Corvina, 20% Corvinone, 20% Rondinella.

Valpolicella Classico Superiore 'Il Velluto', Meroni, 2018

69

A special bottling from Saint'Ambrogio wherein the grapes are dried for 30 days after harvest, essentially making it a 'Baby Amarone', yet striking in its classy, exotic delivery of flavours. 30% Corvina, 30% Corvinone, 30% Rondinella, 10% Molinara.

Valpolicella Ripasso Superiore 'Maciòn', La Collina dei Ciliegi, 2022

57

The vines here are the highest in Valpantena, with a growing season one month longer than the valley floor, lending grapes higher in aromatic complexity. Ten-days in Amarone & Recioto pomace, 12 months in tonneau. 70% Corvina, 25% Corvinone, 5% Rondinella.

Valpolicella Ripasso Classico Superiore, Carlo Meroni, 2021

75

Fifteen-day re-fermentation on Amarone & Recioto pomace & 30 months' aging in 20-hl Slavonian oak barrels produce an elegant, concentrated expression of this famous wine. 30% Corvina, 30% Corvinone, 30% Rondinella, & 10% Molinara.

AMARONE DELLA VALPOLICELLA

Amarone della Valpolicella Classico, Giuseppe Quintarelli, 2017

580

The top name in Amarone, 'Bepe' Quintarelli passed away in 2012 but his daughter, Fiorenza, has continued her father's evocative, dazzling attention to detail & quality in their now legendary Amarone, only bottled in the best vintages & aged seven years in large barrel, utilising an astonishing array of grapes that include the usual Valpolicella suspects in Corvina, Corvinone, Rondinella as well as Nebbiolo, Sangiovese, Cabernet, & Croatina.

Amarone della Valpolicella, Marion, 2019

130

Elegance & savoury nuance abound in this stunning rendition as only winemaker Stefano Campedelli could construct, emphasising the important Corvina grapes, which constitute 90% (50% Corvina, 40% Corvinone) of the blend, much higher than most cuvées in the region. Three years' aging in Slavonian botti.

Amarone della Valpolicella Classico, Venturini, 2019

108

Limestone soils provide freshness & minerality in this otherwise full-throated wine, clocking in at 16.5% Vol. but still managing balance, complexity, energy. 70% Corvina, 25% Rondinella, 5% Molinara, aged two years in oak after a 90-day appassimento.

Amarone della Valpolicella, La Collina dei Ciliegi, 2020

96

A fragrant, spicy version by the Gianolli family who always strive to express their Veronese terroir, no simple feat with four months of appassimento, which precedes 24 months aging in French oak. 39% Corvina, 30% Corvinone, 31% Rondinella. 15% Vol.

Amarone della Valpolicella, Torre del Falasco, 2022

84

Corvina, Corvinone, & Rondinella grapes (85%, 10%, & 5% of the blend, respectively) are sourced from steep, chalky, terraced hillsides in Valpantena, then matured 18 months in barriques after a four-month appassimento.

TRENTINO-ALTO ADIGE

Teroldego Rotaliano Superiore Riserva, Castel Firmian, 2022

47

Teroldego is a magical varietal, exhibiting many of the same traits as Syrah - of which it is a cousin - with its dark fruit, capacity for aging & complexity, & smooth structure. Two years' aging, one of which was in Allier oak barrels.

Pinot Nero Riserva 'St. Daniel', Colterenzio, 2022

64

Pinot Noir is not widely-planted in Italy, most of the peninsula being too hot, but it has found a cool-climate home in Trentino, & this is a beautifully constructed Riserva by one of the region's top producers; two years' aging, one in barrel & another in bottle.

A DOCG of impossibly steep vineyards, UNESCO-listed stone walls holding the vined terraces together, donkeys carrying stones back up the mountain to replace the erosion, jagged mountain peaks in the distance, and loads of small, family wineries producing this elegant, alpine, textural expression of the Nebbiolo grape, locally known as Chiavennasca.

Valtellina Superiore Valgella Vigna Cà Morei, Sandro Fay, 2019

76

This is 'light-bodied' Nebbiolo, but with enough punch of tannins to remind you of what we're dealing with; 12 months aging in barrel, a single-vineyard expression from Fay's Cà Morei cru that remains one of my favourite values on this list.

Valtellina Superiore Valgella Vigna Carteria Riserva, Sandro Fay, 2019

94

From the finest cru in Fay's range, sitting at 500 metres elevation, Carteria is aged for 12 months in 30 hl oak casks and then another year in bottle. An enticing savoury flavour profile is supported by high-elevation acidity and pure, precise fruit.

FRIULI-VENEZIA GIULIA

Pinot Nero, Bressan, 2018

96

A bewitching and quite extraordinary expression as only the gifted hands of Fulvio Bressan could craft, macerating his Pinot Noir for 30 days, then aging it for three years in large-format barrels. Spice, pepper, herbs, charcoal, like you're standing next to his grill in the alpine foothills.

Schioppettino, Casali Roncali, 2023

59

Of the 500+ indigenous varietals of Italy, few are as exciting as Schioppettino, a grape capable of great complexity and elegance, all wonderfully captured in this peppery, light-bodied expression, aged 6 months, half in steel and half in used barrel after a gentle 10-day maceration.

LIGURIA

Rossese di Dolceacqua Superiore, Tenuta Anfosso, 2016

63

Dolceacqua is a quaint-as-you-like town near the Ligurian coast, famous for its old stone bridge, but it should be more famous for its wines. They're amazing, exhibiting herbs, flowers, minerals, meatiness, red fruits, a dazzling and elegant mouthfeel. Anfosso works some of the steepest slopes in the DOC, all facing the sea; 50% whole-bunch fermentation, one year aging in steel.

UMBRIA

Montefalco Rosso Vigna Flaminia-Maremmana, Arnaldo Caprai, 2023

58

Not quite a 'single' vineyard bottling but sourced from three plots located along Via Flaminia, an old road that connects Umbria with Maremma. An at once brooding yet refined Montefalco DOC blend of 70% Sangiovese, 15% Sagrantino, 15% Merlot.

Montefalco Sagrantino Colle Grimaldesco, Tabarrini, 2010

89

Sagrantino is the most hallowed grape of Umbria, and shows off all of its full-bodied, vivacious, and feral potential in the Montefalco Sagrantino DOCG bottlings that most estates in the area release. Tabarrini produces so many incredible single-vineyard versions that we have two: this one is the fuller-bodied, fruitier version.

Montefalco Sagrantino Vigna Campo alla Cerqua, Tabarrini, 2009

99

Sagrantino from Giampaolo Tabarrini's smallest vineyard, the calcareous Campo alla Cerqua, and probably his most refined. Drinking this is like watching a bear take a nap - you know there is power there, but it comes across so peacefully, so soothingly.

Conero Riserva Grigiano, Malacari, 2016

84

Grigiano is the hill from which these Montepulciano grapes are sourced, 200 metres elevation, facing the Adriatic sea a stone's throw away on luscious limestone, just an amazing winegrowing area. Forty year-old vines, 20 months in barrel, a stunning effort.

Conero Riserva 'Cùmaro', Umani Ronchi, 2021

74

Cùmaro is a nod to the Greek name for the nearby Conero Mountain, after which this DOC is named. Montepulciano grapes are aged 14 months in oak and aided by proximity to the sea, lending its salty breezes. Power, dark fruits, herbs, oak spice.

Rosso Piceno Superiore, Franco Aurora, 2020

49

Rosso Piceno is a little-known DOC typically combining the local Montepulciano grape with Sangiovese, and in this case, a touch of Cabernet Sauvignon to boost colour and structure. Six months aging in large, used barrel.

Lacrima di Morro d'Alba, Velenosi, 2021

36

Lacrima di Morro is a red grape indigenous to Marche and just about the only place you'll find it. Lavender, dark fruits, freshness.

ABRUZZO

Montepulciano d'Abruzzo Riserva Villa Gemma, Gianni Masciarelli, 2018

140

Masciarelli's top bottling which has received somewhat of a cult status, this is low-yield Montepulciano grapes as they were meant to be. Thirty-day maceration in oak barrels lends plenty of power and flavour that is then tempered and layered by 18 months' aging in barrel followed by another 24 months in bottle. A stunning mouthfeel, concentration, a long, lingering finish.

Montepulciano d'Abruzzo Vigneto Sant'Eusanio, Valle Reale, 2020

72

Stainless steel fermentation and aging (one year), from a single vineyard delightfully buried in a pine forest not far from the coast and at 500 metres, this remarkable bottling showcases a less showy but suave side to Montepulciano, like that kid in secondary school who was popular *and* volunteered at the old folks' home on the weekends.

Montepulciano d'Abruzzo Colline Teramane, Gran Sasso, 2022

57

A superlative wine by most measurements: high ripeness and high alcohol meet two years' aging in oak: chocolatey, fruity, rich.

Montepulciano d'Abruzzo, Gianni Masciarelli, 2021

49

That the same winemaker is responsible for the Villa Gemma bottling, above, as this one just goes to show the remarkable range on hand in the Masciarelli lab. This is all stainless-steel production, showing the herbal, savoury, red-fruited side to this remarkable grape.

MOLISE

Biferno Rosso, Palladino, 2019

35

A deep, dark, earthy, delectably satisfying combination of 70% Montepulciano and 30% Aglianico, a blend typical of the Biferno DOC located along the river of the same name; aged 18 months in large oak barrels and then for 18 months in stainless steel.

BASILICATA

Aglianico del Vulture, Donato d'Angelo, 2020

60

From a small estate sitting at 500m in elevation with exposed volcanic soils from Mount Vulture - an extinct volcano from which the wine and DOC gets its name - aged 18 months in bottle to produce old-vine Aglianico at its spicy, smoky best. Amazing value.

75

Puglia style at its apex: grapes from the Manduria DOC are left to overripe slightly, fermentation occurs in steel but not to completion, so there are trace amounts of residual sugar in this big, beautiful beast. 18 months' aging in French oak barriques. Lip-smacking stuff.

Susumaniello, Podere Don Cataldo, 2021

45

Only about 70 hectares are planted to the unheralded Susumaniello, which brings a fresh, herbal side to Puglia fruit and heat.

Canace, Cantina Diomede, 2022

59

100% Nero di Troia and nothing shy about this inky-black wine, aged 12 months in new French oak; lots of fruit, oak spice, body.

Negroamaro 'I Muri', Vigneti del Salento, 2024

39

Negroamaro means 'black bitter' in Italian but this varietal is actually on the lower end in terms of tannins among Puglian grapes, but the 'black' part of the name is accurate: dark fruits with earth and chocolate and a nice acidity to keep things bright.

Salice Salentino Riserva 'Selvarossa dei Confratelli', Cantine Due Palme, 2017

66

There's a vibrant meatiness to this Salice Salentino DOC from the Salento peninsula in southern Puglia; a blend of 80% Negroamaro, 20% Malvasia Nera, and aged for a full two years in new oak before release.

CAMPANIA

Taurasi Riserva, Cantina Sanpaolo, 2012

69

Old-vine Aglianico at 500m are cooled by breezes from the Bay of Naples, the same natural force that has, over time, blown volcanic soil inland from Vesuvius. This Riserva shows class and strength all at once: aged three years, including two in oak.

Taurasi Riserva, Mastroberardino, 2015*

130

Probably the most famous wine from Campania is this Taurasi DOCG bottling by Mastroberardino, the great pioneer of Campanian indigenous varietals since 1878. From the highest portion of the Montemarano estate, this wine is aged 5 years in total: 30 months in French and Slavonian oak, 30 months in bottle after that. Sensual, smoky, smooth, sculpted Aglianico.

Sciapo', Terre di Valter, 2018

75

In the film Jurassic Park, Ian Malcolm - played so brilliantly by Jeff Goldblum - makes the point that it's possible to get random results from normal systems, where you can get chaos out of order, what he calls 'Chaos Theory'. That is this wine. What seems like perfectly orderly Aglianico grapes from the unassuming Irpinia Campi Taurasini DOC undergo 'chaos': partial appassimento, old withered vines, 12 months in barriques, so you get smoke and roasted fruits and meat and chocolate and funk. That, that's Chaos Theory.

CALABRIA

Ciro Rosso Classico 'Segno', Librandi, 2022

37

Gaglioppo is native to Calabria and Ciro is its main DOC, making red-fruited, elegant wines with wonderful structure and earthiness.

Ciro Rosso Classico Superiore, Vigneti Vumbaca, 2020

49

There's a finessed, Pinot Noir-type elegance to this sublime bottling with that touch of rustic character typical of Calabria, vinified and aged strictly in stainless steel to highlight that Calabrian touch and its sun-kissed Gaglioppo grapes.

Ciro Rosso Classico Riserva 'Più Vite', Sergio Arcuri, 2018

83

The Piciara plot from which this comes is planted with 70 year-old vines right on the sea, astonishingly, so the soil is clay and sand. Aged for four years in concrete; a stunning wine that pairs excellently with tomato-based sauces and long eye contact.

- Cannonau di Sardegna 'Bantu', Antichi Poderi Jerzu, 2023** 39
Cannonau is the native name for Grenache, but from the Cannonau di Sardegna DOC, it's light-to-medium bodied, red fruited, extravagantly floral, and carries the island's signature rustic freshness.
- Cannonau di Sardegna Riserva 'Berteru', Cantina Gungui, 2017** 86
Old vine, high-elevation Cannonau is fermented in steel and then aged in 30 hl casks for 12 months. You feel like you're on the island - there's saltiness, herbs, red fruits, something pleasantly rustic about it - and all this is delivered with poise and elegance.
- Carignano del Sulcis Riserva, Rocca Rubia Santadi, 2022** 64
Robust yet refined Carignano, from poor, well-draining sandy soils typical of the Sulcis DOC and which always seem to produce wines of high aromatics and finesse, and that combined with the heft added from 12 months' aging in new and used oak is a profound experience.
- Montessu Isola dei Nuraghi, Agripunica, 2022** 72
A high-octane collaboration between Santadi and Tenuta San Guido, author of Sassicaia, this 'Super Sardinian' is a powerhouse of a blend based on Carignano (60%) with 10% each of Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Merlot, Syrah; from a portion of Isola dei Nuraghi IGT rich in sandy clay-limestone, aged in cement a few months, then bottled.

SICILIA

- Nero d'Avola 'Nero di Pianogrillo', Pianogrillo, 2024** 40
Nero d'Avola is the most important grape in Sicily, the most-planted and the most-exported, and this bottling is similar to Malbec and other such grapes with its beguiling red and dark fruit flavours, lovely spice, full body, and fruit-forward nature.
- Frappato, Mandrarossa, 2024** 36
Frappato is a delightfully light-bodied and light-hued varietal native to the Ragusa area of Sicily whose build and body is similar to a Pinot Noir, only lighter. One of those reds you could not go wrong chilling, if it's hot out. From the large Terre Siciliane IGT.

MOUNT ETNA

Is there a more exciting category in Italian wine right now than Etna Rosso? The Nerello Mascalese grape on which it is based is increasingly included in the country's Holy Trinity with Nebbiolo and Sangiovese; the Contrada system continues to be developed and refined, measuring distinct grape-growing areas based on the soil composition and the age of lava flows that have occurred over the millennia on Europe's most active volcano; and, fine wine has only been produced here for only about two decades, so it feels like we're just getting started. What does the future hold here? Based on the mountain's fiery, fragrant, finessed reds produced so far, only good things.

- Etna Rosso Contrada Rampante, Tasca, 2019** 102
The Rampante vineyard stretches a mere 4.28 hectares on a lava flow 15,000 years old, planted to 30 year-old vines. 100% Nerello Mascalese is aged 12 months in 25 hl Slavonian oak casks to produce a simply sensational representative of Etna terroir.
- Etna Rosso 'Cirneco', Terrazze dell'Etna, 2019** 64
This wine is 100% Nerello Mascalese, indigenous to the island and to Europe's most active volcano, Mount Etna, whose black volcanic soils speak just as loudly in the wine as anything else. This is a succulent bottling, spicy and balanced, aged for 12 months in French tonneaux.
- Etna Rosso Contrada Moganazzi 'Aetneus', I Custodi, 2021** 82
Excellent, serious, savoury yet elegant Etna Rosso, 80% Nerello Mascalese and 20% Nerello Cappuccio, from 100 year-old vines, aged for four years before release, including two years in 5-hl used tonneaux.

MAGNUM WINES

Magnums and other larger-format bottles are famous for their extra ageability - the limited surface area exposed to air means the aging development in bottle is slower, more gentle, more graceful, so we tried to focus on providing bottles with a bit of age to highlight this great feature of Magnums and their (large) cousins. Plus, they just look really cool.
